COMMUNITY TRANSFORMATION

THE PROGRAMS

The NC Main Street & Rural Planning Center (the Center) manages the NC Main Street programs, including Main Street, Small Town Main Street, and the Downtown Associate Community program; the NC Rural Planning Program, including the Creating Outdoor Recreation Economies (CORE) initiative; the federally funded Rural Transformation Grant Fund (RTGF) – Downtown Revitalization category; the state funded Rural Downtown Economic Development Grant; and the NC Main to Main Trail initiative. Through the Center's programming, staff provides North Carolina communities with strategic economic development planning, technical assistance, extensive training and education, and grants for downtown revitalization. CORE and the Main to Main Trail are economic development initiatives that are supported in part by a U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) State Tourism Grant.

THE SERVICES Strategic Economic Development Planning

The NC Main Street Program team works with designated Main Street programs and their community leaders to develop market-driven, asset based, five-year strategic economic development plans and one-to-two-year implementation/action plans for downtowns. The Main Street Four-Point Approach® for downtown revitalization, (Economic Vitality, Design, Promotion, and Organization), created by the National Main Street Center, is used to



The NC Rural Planning Program works with local governments to develop asset-based strategic economic development plans. These plans help community leaders identify, prepare for, and respond to growth opportunities. Rural Planning staff worked with 33 communities on strategic planning projects and completed 14 community economic development assessments and economic development strategic plans in 2024. The program also continued to implement the CORE initiative that it launched in 34 communities in 2023. In 2024, staff worked with CORE communities to identify outdoor recreation assets that presented opportunities for economic growth and to develop strategies and projects to increase tourism, encourage small business development, enhance residents' quality of life, plan for asset and infrastructure development, and attract outdoor gear manufacturers. The program completed eight CORE strategic plans in 2024.

Technical Assistance

Providing high quality technical assistance for North Carolina communities is a primary component of the day-to-day work of the NC Main Street & Rural Planning Center. The team provides communities with Main Street program, downtown revitalization, and rural economic development best practices, property redevelopment and small business guidance, information and resources for project funding opportunities, local government operations support, market analysis and mobile phone location data, Geographic Information System (GIS) analysis and mapping, and tools and templates to build local capacity.



In partnership with the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (UNC Greensboro), Department of Interior Architecture, the NC Main Street Program provides designated Main Street and Small Town Main Street programs with façade improvement plans and upper story schematic plans for property and business owners located in downtown districts. Students, known as Main Street Fellows, meet with downtown property owners and create plans in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation. UNC Greensboro completed 26 design plans during the 2024 calendar year.

UNC System Partners Support CORE Communities

Communities that complete CORE strategic plans with the Rural Planning Program are eligible to receive implementation services from four University of North Carolina (UNC) System partners: the Center for Industry Research and Engagement at UNC Greensboro; NCGrowth at UNC Chapel Hill; East Carolina University; and the Initiative for Community Growth and Development at North Carolina State University. In 2024, UNC System partners completed four projects in CORE communities and were engaged in eight others. Projects have included the development of marketing plans and social media tools, design studies to connect outdoor recreation assets with communities and businesses, lodging feasibility studies, and an economic impact analysis of an outdoor resource. Financial support for the UNC System partners' services is provided by the U.S. EDA grant that funds the CORE initiative.

Rural Community Capacity (RC2) Program Assistance

The Rural Community Capacity (RC2) program, part of the RTGF, provides local governments with educational programming, technical assistance, and other support to help them plan and implement economic development programs and projects. In 2024, the Rural Economic Development Division offered the program in partnership with the Walker College of Business at Appalachian State University (ASU) and the Master of Public Administration Program at East Carolina University (ECU). Of the 19 local governments selected for the 2024 RC2 program, ECU assisted eight and ASU supported 11. In August 2024, the Rural Planning Program provided project development training to 10 local governments at ASU. The session helped the communities hone project ideas into funding pitches to prepare them to submit RTGF Community Implementation grant applications.

Hurricane Helene Response in Western NC

The NC Main Street & Rural Planning Center and Appalachian Regional Commission teams assumed an active role in fall 2024 to support and assist communities in western North Carolina devastated by the physical and economic impacts of Hurricane Helene. Immediately following the hurricane, staff began a comprehensive community outreach effort to establish contact with local governments in the counties covered by the federal disaster declaration. Staff created a disaster recovery webpage, established a recovery database, and regularly shared resources and funding opportunities with leaders of impacted communities. In November and December, staff worked with other Rural Economic Development Division (REDD) team members to launch Operation Elf to collect toys and gifts that were donated to benefit the Fairview Community Center and families impacted by Hurricane Helene. In 2025, staff will continue to support impacted communities through the Western North Carolina Economic Recovery and Rebuilding initiative to provide community engagement, planning, capacity building, and resources and support to help impacted communities' economies recover faster.

Training & Education

Attendance counts for the NC Main Street & Rural Planning Center's robust training and education opportunities totaled 2,354 in 2024, the largest number in the Center's history. Through an effort to take training to rural communities, 24 statewide trainings were offered in locations within all eight prosperity zones. The Center launched a new educational series for economic development professionals and potential developers on small scale development and historic tax credits, and another series on creating destination businesses and communities. Both series featured eight workshops each. In addition to the new trainings, the Center hosted Regional Meetings with downtown professionals in May and November, and a Main Street Directors' Meeting in Belmont in August 2024.

A record-breaking number of training & education participants!

Main Street Basic Training courses were held in January, April, August, and October, and provided Main Street and Small Town Main Street program staff, board members, and volunteers with in-depth knowledge of the components of each of the four areas of Main Street's comprehensive program: *Economic Vitality, Design, Promotion*, and *Organization*. Partnerships are important to the Center, and staff offered training in 2024 through collaborations with UPLIFT (Understand, Plan, Link, Innovate, Finance and Tell), Appalachian State University, and VisitNC. Community-specific trainings provide opportunities to build capacity at the local level, and trainings were provided to CORE communities on outdoor recreation economies and to designated Main Street, Small Town Main Street, and Downtown Associate Community programs for board and committee members on a variety of downtown revitalization topics.

In an effort to better tell the story of downtown revitalization and rural economic development in North Carolina, communication was a primary focus for the NC Main Street & Rural Planning Center in 2024. Staff shared resources, educational and funding opportunities, and community success stories through both traditional communication methods and social media tools. The NC Main Street Facebook page experienced a 20% increase in reach and a 14% increase in individual followers. The NC Rural Planning Facebook page, launched in late 2023, experienced a 97% increase in followers. The NC Main Street and Planning training website was enhanced with more videos, program guidance, and training opportunities for North Carolina communities and experienced a 36% increase in webpage views.

Training & Education Continued



NC Main Street Conference

The NC Main Street Conference is the largest statewide downtown revitalization conference held in the United States. The 23rd annual conference, themed *Ignite*, *Activate*, *Empower...Main Street*, was held in March 2024 in Goldsboro, NC. It was a record-breaking event that attracted 805 attendees from 138 North Carolina communities and 12 other states. Erin Barnes, President and CEO of Main Street America, was in attendance to deliver a plenary address to the audience. The 2024 Annual Main Street Awards Ceremony honored 16 Main Street projects, and the 2023 Main Street Champions Recognition Ceremony honored 40 individuals, organizations, and agencies that made significant contributions to their local Main Street programs.

Small Scale Development and Historic Tax Credit Workshops

In 2024, the NC Main Street & Rural Planning Center, in collaboration with the NC State Historic Preservation Office, launched a series of workshops designed to educate local commercial property owners and economic development staff on small scale development. The purpose of the training was to build local capacity on how to utilize the historic tax credit program as a funding mechanism to redevelop downtown commercial properties. Six workshops were held in six of the eight prosperity zones in 2024, and two workshops will be held in 2025 in the other two zones. A total of 246 individuals from 112 communities took part in the training in 2024.

Making Your Community & Business a Destination

Funded in part through a U.S. EDA grant to enhance the NC Main to Main Trail and help designated NC Main Street communities become more economically viable districts, the NC Main Street team launched a series of workshops led by Jon Schallert, President of the Schallert Group, a



national destination creation firm. The training provided small businesses and local Main Street directors with Schallert's 14-step "destination business" process. In 2024, eight workshops were held in the state's eight prosperity zones and an online education portal was established for businesses that could not attend the in-person workshops. A total of 429 individuals from 66 of 72 NC Main Street communities received the training in 2024 and are eligible to participate in an advanced training series in 2025.

THE GRANTS

Rural Downtown Economic Development Grant

In March 2024, the N.C. Department of Commerce's Rural Economic Development Division launched a new state funded category within the Rural Engagement and Investment portfolio called the Rural Downtown Economic Development (RDED) Grant. Intended to support job creation and retention in downtown districts through investment in publicly owned property, 35 grants were awarded during the 2024 calendar year to local governments in NC Development Tier 1 and 2 counties, and rural census tracts in Tier 3 counties. Projects funded through the RDED Grant include public infrastructure, public buildings, and mixed-use development projects, including downtown streetscape improvement projects, community facilities and gathering places, commercial/residential redevelopment projects, and the rehabilitation/expansion of historic downtown buildings. Grant awards totaled \$15,177,112 in 2024 and will support 1,951 jobs in downtown districts.

Rural Transformation Grant Fund

The RTGF continued in 2024 with project implementation. The fund was made available through the American Rescue Plan Act. Although no new grants were awarded in 2024, 43 grants were awarded in 2022 and 2023, totaling \$26,580,556, and were administered through the 2024 calendar year. All funded projects will be completed by December 31, 2026, and three projects were completed in 2024 in Elkin, Roxboro, and Valdese, NC.




