

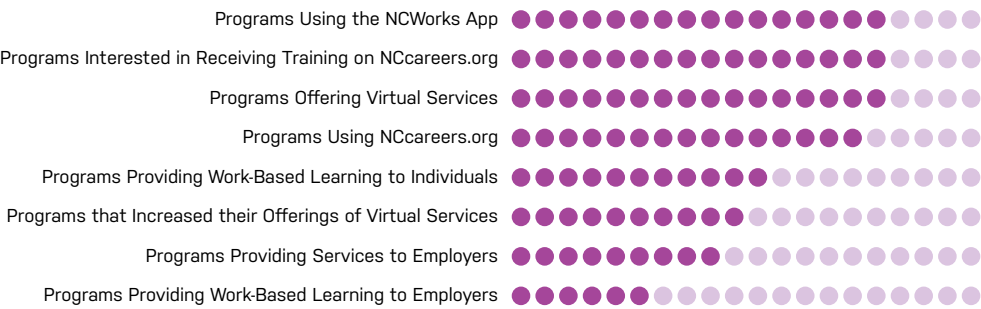


ANNUAL PROGRAM REVIEW 2023-2024

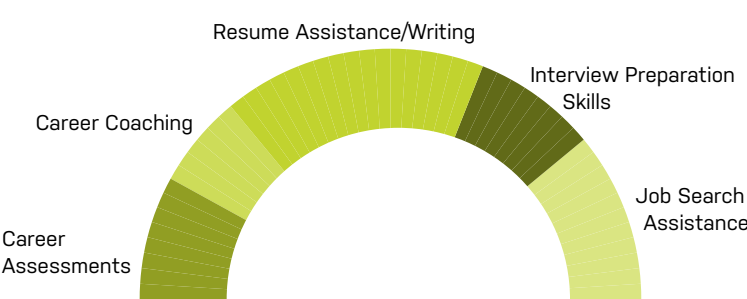
HOW MANY PROGRAMS ARE POWERED BY NCWORKS OPPORTUNITIES?



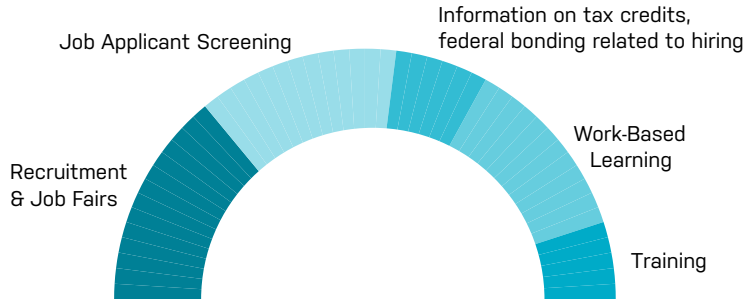
TOP 3 INDUSTRIES SERVED



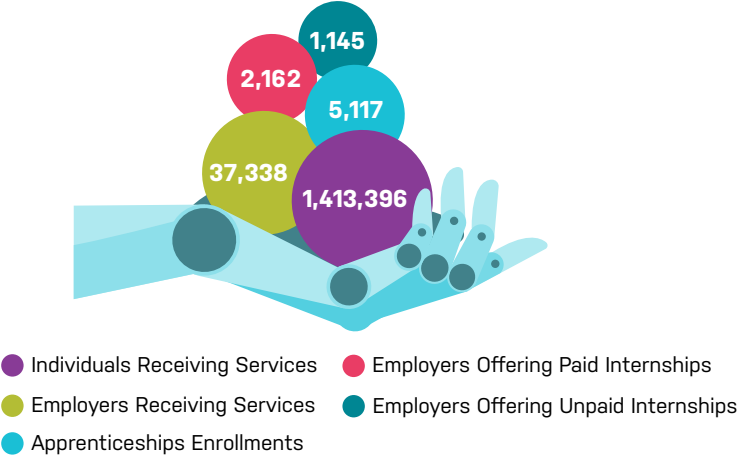
TOP 5 SERVICES FOR INDIVIDUALS



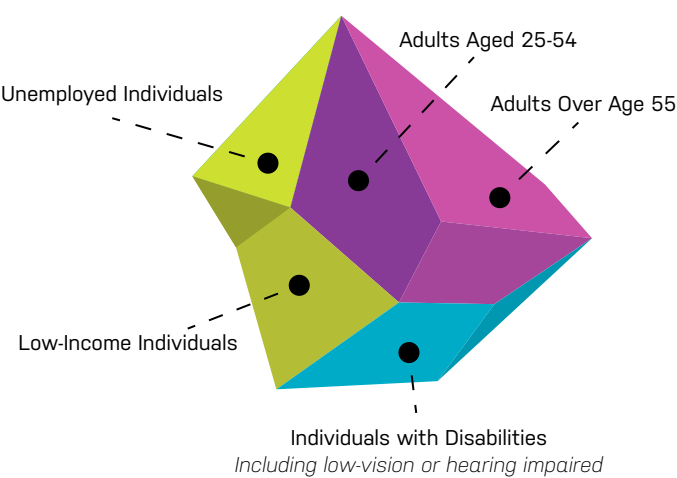
TOP 5 SERVICES FOR EMPLOYERS
