## Ecolab Inc. to Add 45 New Jobs in Greensboro

Governor Pat McCrory, N.C. Commerce Secretary John E. Skvarla III and the Economic Development Partnership of N.C. announced January 28 that Ecolab Inc. will expand its Kay Chemical Company operations in Greensboro and create 45 new jobs over the next three years. The company plans to build a new 37,000 square foot office building and invest \$10 million in Guilford County.

"Kay Chemical Company has had a great corporate presence in Greensboro for years," said Governor McCrory. "By building this new facility and adding these new jobs, the company is strengthening its continued commitment to North Carolina and to the city of Greensboro."

Located in Greensboro, Kay Chemical Company is a division of Ecolab Inc. The Kay business specializes in delivering customized programs to meet the unique food safety and sanitation requirements of the quick serve restaurants and retail food markets. It currently has more than 490 employees in North Carolina.

"North Carolina continues to be a great place for our existing businesses to expand," said Secretary Skvarla. "It is vital that we continue to work with companies such as Kay Chemical with a long history of doing business in North Carolina to strengthen our state's economy."

#### New Era for Economic Development Begins as EDPNC Celebrates Opening

Governor Pat McCrory marked the headquarters grand opening for the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina (EDPNC) on January 22 with a ribbon cutting ceremony and press conference. The governor also introduced Christopher Chung, the new CEO of the organization. North Carolina Commerce Secretary John Skvarla was on hand along with other dignitaries to discuss the state's new approach to recruiting jobs, new business and marketing opportunities.

"Although the Partnership has been hard at work, Thursday is a moment for us to stop and recognize the significant shift we're making in North Carolina toward more aggressive and collaborative recruitment efforts," said Governor McCrory. "The Partnership is already helping us create jobs across the state, and that will only gain steam under the leadership of our new and accomplished CEO Christopher Chung."

Chung joined the EDPNC last month and is widely known and experienced in the industry, most recently serving as CEO of the Development, and the City of Greensboro.

### **Embracing Wellness on a Shoestring**

To see how much progress the North Carolina School for the Deaf has made on staff health and wellness issues, a visit to a recent staff meeting would tell you a lot. Six employees wearing "Happy Happy Happy" t-shirts opened the meeting by gathering up front and dancing to "Happy," the catchy Pharrell Williams song, as it blasted across the room. Soon all 150 employees were on their feet, dancing and laughing.

"Even the maintenance men were dancing, I couldn't believe it," laughs Nurse Supervisor Joy Cook, who has been leading the staff health and wellness efforts at the state facility. After "Happy" came Latino music, a line-dance lesson and later a celebration of all that School for the Deaf's Wellness Committee has achieved over a two year period - including signing up two-thirds of fellow staff members to exercise in the new fitness room.

Previously, the fitness room was a staff development room. Like most of its work, the Wellness Committee converted the space into a Wellness Center with no budget. Staff and their families donated exercise equipment and workout videos. They've developed monthly challenges, with prizes often donated personally by Director Audrey Garvin, to draw and maintain fitness interest. Other accomplishments have included new healthy vending options, healthy catering policies, and a "zen" room for meditation or relaxing.

"We have learned that through focusing on our own well-being, we are better role models for our students, our families and coworkers." said Garvin, who lost more than 20 pounds in the process of championing the healthy changes at the school.

**Healthy Places Change Lives** is a partnership between the N.C. Department of Commerce and Prevention Partners, a nonprofit based in Chapel Hill. Prevention Partners guides schools, workplaces, hospitals and clinics to address the leading causes of preventable disease. The non-profit's Healthy Together NC initiative aims to reach at least 10 organizations

Missouri Partnership. He launched and led Missouri's public-private partnership to be recognized as one of the country's best economic development programs.

"I am happy to be here in North Carolina, a state everybody knows is among the most formidable in the country when it comes to attracting visitors and bringing home business," said Chung. "In a state with so much to offer, our job is to get our story out around the world."

EDPNC is a private, non-profit corporation that works collaboratively with the N.C. Department of Commerce and is focused on making the state more competitive at recruiting new business, helping existing companies expand and creating jobs. It was created to consolidate and enhance North Carolina's marketing and recruitment functions, and oversees the state's efforts in business and job recruitment and retention, international trade, and tourism, film and sports development.



### Appalachian Regional Commission Chief Visits N.C.

North Carolina Commerce Assistant Secretary for Rural Development Dr. Pat Mitchell hosted Scott Hamilton, the new Executive Director of the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) for a series of site visits in western North Carolina January 22. The focus of Hamilton's tour was North Carolina projects funded by ARC, the regional economic development agency established by the U.S. Congress in 1965. 29 counties in North Carolina fall within ARC's boundaries.

During Hamilton's visit, ARC-funded projects with a focus on job creation and retention were highlighted. Stops included the Universal Pathways Skill Center in Marion, Altec in Burnsville, Pittsburg Glassworks in Elkin, the Mount Airy/Surry County Airport in in all 100 counties of the state by 2025. #### Mitchell Commentary on Rural Health Published in N.C. Medical Journal

The importance of building capacity in rural communities, including capacities associated with accessing health care is the focus of a commentary published in the January issue of the North Carolina Medical Journal. The article, written by Assistant Secretary for Rural Development Dr. Pat Mitchell and Olivia Collier, North Carolina's Program Manager for the Appalachian Regional Commission outlines the many ways the North Carolina Department of Commerce works to increase community capacity throughout the state.

The January issue of the Journal discusses factors that influence the well-being of residents in rural communities in North Carolina. These include factors related to health care, such as physician recruitment and retention, the effects of hospital closures, and the need for behavioral health services, and factors beyond the health care sphere, such as child care, health behaviors, economic development, and access to health services.

#### Students and Teachers Can Apply for Oak Ridge Lab Summer Study Opportunity

The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC), in collaboration with the U.S. Department of Energy's Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL) and the Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education (ORISE) in Oak Ridge, Tennessee is offering two residential, hands-on learning institutes focusing on math, science, and technology this summer.

The institute for high school students and teachers will be held July 11-24 and one for middle school students will be conducted July 19-24.

The participants will spend most days in one of several ORNL research laboratories, but field trips to nearby industries, universities, and museums will illustrate applications of math and science in the real world and provide participants with opportunities to learn more about Appalachia and some of its unique characteristics.
