Bluestar Silicones to bring 125 jobs to Mecklenburg County

Governor Bev Perdue on Feb. 25 announced that Bluestar Silicones, a fully integrated global silicones manufacturer, will locate a new facility in Mecklenburg County. The company plans to create 125 jobs and invest \$19.8 million during the next three years in Charlotte. The project was made possible in part by a \$340,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Ron Leitch was the developer on this project.

"North Carolina's reputation for a top-ranked business climate continues to attract high-tech manufacturers like Bluestar," said Perdue. "The creation of these high-paying jobs is terrific news for the Charlotte community and underscores the value of the region's -- and the state's -- highly skilled workers."

Bluestar Silicones provides specialty silicone products to the automotive, paper and packaging, aerospace, personal care, healthcare, tire and rubber, textile coatings, mold making, and energy industries. Headquartered in China, Bluestar maintains operations in China, Europe, Latin America and the United States. The company plans to consolidate manufacturing operations in other states into a single facility at the former Virkler Chemical site in Charlotte.

Salaries will vary by job function, but the average annual wage for the new jobs will be \$62,040 plus benefits. The Mecklenburg County average annual wage is \$51,584. Learn more.

Fairmont Designs, a California furniture manufacturer, announced Feb. 18 that it will establish an upholstery furniture manufacturing and distribution facility in Hickory which will create 200 jobs over the next four years. The company has purchased a former Thomasville Furniture building and will spend some \$1.5 million on upfitting the facility. N.C. Department of Commerce Developers Ron Leitch of the Charlotte Regional office and Melissa Smith of the Triad office assisted the company in their location efforts.

The company maintains a showroom in High Point during the International Furniture Market. Other partners in the project were the N.C. Community College System, the N.C. Employment Security Commission and the Catawba County Economic Development Corporation.
