N.C. tourism industry leaders meet at the 2012 Governor's Conference

The 2012 N.C. Governor's Conference on Tourism is being held March 11-13 at the Embassy Suites in Concord. Nearly 500 North Carolina businesses, tourism professionals and people from related industries are attending.

"Each year more than 500 leaders of our tourism industry come together to learn the latest in marketing strategies. This year it's even more important in this emerging economic recovery," said Lynn Minges, assistant secretary for Tourism, Marketing and Global Branding for the North Carolina Department of Commerce. "Expert speakers and panelists will inspire our participants and spark new ideas."

"Setting the Pace" is the theme of this year's conference. Keynote speakers include Roger Dow, president and CEO of US Travel Association, presenting "Why Travel Matters"; Sally Hogshead, author of "Fascinate: Your 7 Triggers to Persuasion and Captivation," presenting "How to Persuade and Influence"; and Danny Morrison, president, Carolina Panthers, presenting how the Panthers are ensuring a unique customer experience.

Northeast commission hosts state of the region

N.C. Department of Commerce Secretary Keith Crisco was among the speakers appearing at North Carolina's Northeast Commission's fourth annual State of the Region meeting in Williamston on Feb. 24. The event, co-sponsored by North Carolina's Northeast Committee of 1000, drew some 300 attendees. Crisco spoke of the importance of job creation to the region's overall economic and social fabric.

"A job is a lot more than a paycheck," he said. "It's about self-worth and putting order into the day." Crisco commended the Northeast's first-of-a-kind Regional School of Biotechnology and Agriscience, as well as other workforce readiness programs. "Education is the common denominator of economic development," he said.

N.C. Northeast Commission President Vann Rogerson reviewed results of the region's business recruitment, infrastructure development, tourism marketing and workforce readiness initiatives. The Northeast, he said, had made measurable progress in embracing economic opportunities associated with alternative energy -- including wind, solar and biomass.

NCEDA focuses on job creation

Creating jobs throughout North Carolina's 100 counties is a top priority for the members of the N.C. Economic Developers Association. The association and its allies gathered on March 2 in Pinehurst to discuss ways to generate job growth and build a foundation for future economic development success. Presentations during the association's midwinter conference covered a diverse range of topics including military defense expansions and clean technology innovation.

N.C. Department of Commerce Deputy Secretary Dale Carroll presented an overview of the department's activities over the past year, including an update on the economic development grant report due to the N.C. General Assembly and two departmental reorganizations that took place this winter. Lieutenant Governor Walter Dalton also spoke at the conference.

Governor Bev Perdue proclaimed March 2 as "Read across America Day" in North Carolina, part of a national effort to encourage children to read on that day and throughout the year.

"Read across America Day," observed on the birthday of Dr. Seuss, promotes reading as the catalyst for students' future academic success and their ability to compete in a 21st century global economy. The event also serves to encourage adults to get involved in children's education as an investment in the well-being of their community and long-term quality of life.

Defense spending increases 13 percent in N.C. during fiscal year 2011

Governor Bev Perdue and The N.C. Military Business Center announced on March 5 that U.S. Department of Defense spending for prime contracts in North Carolina exceeded \$4 billion in federal fiscal year 2011 - an increase of 13 percent and \$471 million over procurement in the state in 2010.

"North Carolina is securing a bigger and bigger share of the global military and defense market," Perdue said. "Our investments and efforts have built a growing cluster of defense industries that is capturing federal revenues and growing jobs right here in North Carolina - the most military friendly state in America."

Perdue helped establish the NCMBC within the North Carolina Community College System and launched the N.C. Military Foundation, a business development organization focused exclusively on building the state's defense and homeland security economy. Read more.

Trade division and N.C. nanotech exporters exhibit in Tokyo

The N.C. Department of Commerce's International Trade Division and three of its nanotechnology clients exhibited at Nano Tech 2012, the 11th annual international nanotechnology exhibition and conference, held Feb. 15-17 in Tokyo. Interest was high in the products of Xanofi and Protochips, both of Raleigh, and NanoForge of Research Triangle Park. "The N.C. Department of Commerce organized the trade show booth, arranged meetings, and even scouted the floor to help North Carolina companies like ours make connections. We have engaged numerous companies, and one large Japanese group is sending a delegation to North Carolina next month," said Xanofi CEO Miles Wright.

The North Carolina exhibit had significant traffic, with Japanese visitors appreciating that staff members from the <u>State of North Carolina Japan Office</u> were available for translating discussions. In addition, the North Carolina companies' brochures and materials were translated into Japanese for the show. This is a service offered as part of the <u>"N.C. Passport to Export" grant program</u>. Over 45,000 visitors attended this tradeonly show.

Study: Solar becoming more affordable

It is getting cheaper to go solar, according to The N.C. Sustainable Energy Association. The organization's new study, "Levelized Cost of Solar Photovoltaics in North Carolina," reports that the average energy cost for the state's installed solar photovoltaic systems of 10 kW or less fell 24 percent between 2006 and 2011. The installed cost of the systems from 10 kW through 500 kW went down 33 percent during that time. And those costs will continue to fall as component and installation costs decrease, installers become more efficient, capacity increases and N.C. policies remain favorable. However, if state and federal tax incentives expire in 2015 as planned and subsidies for other U.S. energy sources continue, solar power costs could be almost double that of power from the state's investor-owned utilities. However, the study indicates that if the incentives are phased out, large solar projects would be competitive with utility residential prices by 2020. The study analyzes the cost solar photovoltaic systems in relation to the retail price of electricity provided from electric utilities in North Carolina.

North Carolina leads east coast ports for container trade volume increases

Growth in North Carolina state ports activity benefits businesses operating in the state, indicating healthier economic outlooks. In a February 8 press release, the N.C. State Ports Authority announced increases in cargo movement for 2011 as compared to 2010. Container movements increased more than 11 percent and general breakbulk cargo increased eight percent during 2011.

According to a Feb. 20 report in *The Journal of Commerce*, North Carolina's port growth contributed to an overall East Coast container trade volume increase of over five percent in the first 10 months of 2011 as compared to the same period in 2010. North Carolina's 14.4 percent trade growth was the highest rate among the top-ten East Coast ports reported. The state was also one of six top ten East Coast ports that showed 10-month growth in 2011 compared to 2008 in total trade, recording an impressive 52.6 percent increase. Read more on.
