### Canadian ambassador visits Raleigh, Charlotte

Canadian Ambassador to the United States Michael Wilson was in Raleigh on April 8 to meet with North Carolina business representatives and state government officials. During a luncheon hosted by Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco, Wilson stressed the importance of strong business ties between North Carolina and his country. He also discussed the significance of a robust trade relationship and how the ties remain strong during this economic slowdown. Wilson spent April 9 in Charlotte.

Canada is North Carolina's largest trade partner. In 2007, North Carolina exported \$5.6 billion worth of goods and services to Canada. More than 100 Canadian companies have operations in North Carolina, including RBC Centura, the wholly owned subsidiary of the Royal Bank of Canada. Canadian companies support more than 11,000 jobs here. North Carolina's tourism industry has also greatly benefited from Canadian visitors, 946,800 of whom visited

#### **Burr visits Biofuels Center**

U.S. Sen. Richard Burr visited the Biofuels Center of North Carolina in Oxford April 7 for a briefing on North Carolina's plan to develop a biofuels industry sector. Sen. Burr is a member of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

The state imports more than 5 billion gallons of liquid fuels annually, costing tens of billions of dollars each year. The long-term task of the Biofuels Center is to reduce the state's dependence on imported liquid fuels. To do so, the center is implementing North Carolina's Strategic Plan for Biofuels Leadership, a mandate from the N.C. General Assembly.

### Commerce releases overview of economic conditions affecting N.C.

Commerce's Division of Policy, Research, and Strategic Planning has developed an "Overview of Current Economic Conditions Affecting North Carolina" report. The report provides a monthly summary of economic indicators using the latest data available: unemployment, industry employment, announced layoffs and closings, foreclosure rates, and home sales. During the month of February, certain economic measures declined at an accelerated pace while others showed signs of slight improvement.

- The state unemployment rate continues to increase.
- Ninety-nine counties experienced an increase in unemployment rates in February.
- North Carolina lost 27,900 jobs in both traditional and knowledge-based sectors.
- Home foreclosures fell sharply and home sales increased in February.

### **German tour operators to visit Outer Banks**

### **Tourism Division promotes N.C. at travel showcase**

North Carolina was well-represented at the annual Travel South Showcase in Kissimmee, Fla., on April 4-8. Lynn Minges, assistant sec. for tourism, marketing and global branding, and Frank Jernigan, director of domestic marketing for the Division of Tourism, attended along with 15 travel industry partners.

The North Carolina group conducted strategic business development meetings with more than 150 tour operators from more than 30 states plus Canada, the United Kingdom, Brazil and Japan. Minges also briefed domestic and international media and tour operators, focusing on what's new with the state's tourism products and on North Carolina's position as a travel destination market leader.

### **Jackson County manufacturer to add 61 jobs**

Gov. Bev Perdue announced April 7 that Stonewall Packaging LLC, a joint project of Jackson Paper Manufacturing Co., is building a new plant in Sylva to produce recycled cardboard packaging.

The company plans to invest more than \$16 million to renovate and modify a vacant mill, creating 61 jobs in Jackson County. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$200,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

"As global markets evolve, North Carolina's manufacturing sector is keeping pace to take advantage of new opportunities," Gov. Perdue said. "Companies like this one are investing in green-friendly products while continuing to enjoy our state's top-rated business climate, skilled workforce and unparalleled quality of life." Read more.

## Scotland County adds natural-products manufacturer, 98 Jobs

Gov. Bev Perdue announced April 8 that Nature's Earth Products Inc., the nation's largest supplier of natural cat litter and manufacturer of hardwood-blend fuel pellets, is opening a new manufacturing facility in Laurinburg. The company plans to invest more than \$12 million and create 98 jobs during the next three years in Scotland County. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$196,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

"North Carolina's forward-looking policies continue to attract companies specializing in emerging green-industry markets," Gov. Perdue said. "Our state's skilled workforce, top-rated business climate and extraordinary quality of life offer the perfect environment for businesses like this one to locate and expand here." Read more.
