### Perdue launches worker training initiative

Gov. Bev Perdue on April 16 launched <u>"Jobs Now: 12 in 6,"</u> a workforce development initiative designed to benefit job seekers, especially those who have lost their jobs due to recent layoffs and plant closures. The initiative will create community college programs in 12 careers, each requiring less than six months to complete. The N.C. Community <u>College System</u> and the N.C. Dept. of Commerce are collaborating on the program as part of Gov. Perdue's larger JobsNOW initiative, which focuses on job creation and economic development.

The new training programs will be available at all <u>58</u> community colleges by the end of September. The state's 24 workforce boards, JobLink Career Centers, and Employment Security Commission offices will connect job seekers with the training programs and employment opportunities.

"North Carolina is well-known for having an outstanding workforce," said Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco. "This program is a great way to help those who have lost their jobs due to the economic downturn and who are eager to get back to work quickly, but who may need to enhance their skills or plan to pursue a new career."

Commerce's Workforce Development Division has allocated \$13.4 million in federal recovery funds to the program. Funding is expected to be distributed to campuses on July 1. <u>Read more</u>.

### N.C. unemployment highest on record

Unemployment in North Carolina reached 10.8 percent in March, up from 10.7 percent in February, according to figures released April 17 by the N.C. Employment Security Commission. That's double the number (5.4 percent) from March 2008. According to the <u>U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics</u>, that's the highest on record for North Carolina.

In total, non-farm payroll employment in the state declined by 41,300 jobs during the month. Nationally, the unemployment rate rose from 8.1 percent in February to 8.5 percent in March.

# New program to help laid-off rural workers start businesses

A new program was launched April 15 to help laid-off rural workers start their own small business. <u>Project GATE</u>, or Growing America Through Entrepreneurship, is being offered by the U.S. Dept. of Labor, and targets dislocated workers from rural counties for a variety of assistance directly related to starting and running a business.

In North Carolina, Project GATE is being offered as a cooperative venture of the Dept. of Commerce, the N.C. Community College System Small Business Center Network, the Employment Security Commission, N.C. REAL Enterprises, local JobLink Career Centers and the <u>Rural Center</u>.

Locally, the Small Business Centers of eight community colleges, which serve 13 rural counties, are partnering with their local JobLink Career Centers to provide GATE services. Dislocated workers in other rural counties may participate service brings. Find out more.

# Database: N.C. in top 5 for alternative energy manufacturing

North Carolina was the fifth-best location for corporate facility expansion projects in the manufacturing of alternative energy in the United States in 2008, according to a Conway Data Inc. database.

Conway Data, which publishes *Site Selection* magazine, tracks the growth of power generation from alternative energy sources, such as bio fuels, solar and wind, in its New Plant Database. According to the database, Ohio was the top location, followed by Texas, Pennsylvania and Michigan. The May issue of *Site Selection* magazine explores why these locations have found favor with alternative energy companies, and looks at where such firms might be headed in the future, both inside the United States and overseas.



# Haw River Valley recognized

The Haw River Valley has earned a special status by being recognized as an American Viticultural Area (AVA), one of the nation's officially designated grape growing regions. The designation certifies the area has features including climate, soil, topography, and elevation that make it a unique grape growing region. The Haw River Valley viticultural area, covering approximately 868 square miles (555,508 acres), is located in all of Alamance County and portions of Caswell, Chatham, Guilford, Orange, and Rockingham Counties. "This program has the potential to do far more than provide a source of income for individuals who've lost jobs," said Billy Ray Hall, president of the N.C. Rural Economic Development Center. "It can help us build homegrown economies in struggling communities all across the state."

# DRS to add 100 jobs in Pasquotank County

Gov. Bev Perdue announced April 13 that DRS Technical Services Inc., a global aircraft services supplier, will expand in Pasquotank County. The company, which services U.S. Coast Guard C-130 aircraft in Elizabeth City, plans to create 100 new jobs during the next two years.

While wages will vary by position, the average annual wage for the 100 new jobs is \$48,779, not including benefits, which exceeds the Pasquotank County average wage of \$27,872.

"When DRS explored expanding our global aircraft services business, North Carolina worked harder to rise above other possible locations. State, county and local government agencies worked closely with us to support our expansion plans and create good-paying new jobs," said Al Dietrich, president of DRS's C3 and Aviation Group. <u>Read more</u>.

# Perdue signs legislation authorizing N.C. Aquarium Pier

Gov. Bev Perdue has signed House Bill 628 for the construction of the North Carolina Aquarium Pier at Nags Head, which will create jobs and enhance tourism in one of North Carolina's most popular destinations.

Construction of the pier will provide 555 on-site jobs and 1,250 off-site jobs and a benefit of more than \$14 million to North Carolina's economy. Formerly known as Jennette's Pier, the North Carolina Aquarium Pier will be an educational satellite facility for the aquariums and be constructed to protect the state's sounds and beaches from storm water runoff.

"Jennette's Pier has been a landmark on the Outer Banks for generations and this legislation will help expedite construction and jump-start the economy," said Senate President Pro Tempore Marc Basnight, D-Dare.

# International Trade Division travels to meet with businesses

Commerce's International Trade Division takes its expertise on the road this week to support and inform North Carolina businesses interested in expanding their presence in the international marketplace. Division staff and the state's foreign trade representatives kicked off their "Go Global Road Show" in Charlotte April 20.
