Novozymes to Expand in Wake County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced today that Novozymes will expand its North Carolina presence by adding a new bioagriculture research and development facility in Wake County. The company plans to create 100 new jobs and invest more than \$36 million over the next three years in Cary. <u>Anna Lea Moore</u> served as the developer on the project for the N.C. Department of Commerce.

"The research and development jobs Novozymes will create will further strengthen our hi-tech hub and be an example of the strong talent pool and attractive quality of life that characterizes Wake County, the Research Triangle and the state," said Governor McCrory.

The planned facility will specifically support Novozymes bioagriculture business. Scientists at the new site will research and develop beneficial microorganisms found in the soil. The resulting technology will focus on improved yield, fertility and pest control for growers around the world.

"With one of the fastest growing economies in our state, Cary and Wake County are leading the way in the Carolina Comeback," said Secretary Decker. "Cutting edge research and development in the biotechnology field will attract even more of the best and brightest minds to North Carolina."

"This is a new day in agriculture. Our growing world population and changing diets demand more crops from our arable land with less inputs. By substantially boosting our research and commercialization of environmentally-friendly microbial technology, we will help farmers meet this demand in a sustainable way for the benefit of agriculture, consumers, the environment and society at large," said Adam Monroe, president, Americas for Novozymes. "We thank the state of North Carolina and our various partners for their support as we work to grow this important part of our business. We look forward to our expanded presence in North Carolina and continuing the great relationships we have in this state."

Foodservice Manufacturer Bringing 100 New Jobs to Alamance County

Governor Pat McCrory and Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced April 18 that Cambro Manufacturing Company is locating its North Carolina manufacturing operations in Alamance County. The company plans to create 100 jobs and invest more than \$30.4 million over the next three years in Mebane. <u>Melissa Smith</u> served as the developer on the project for the N.C. Department of Commerce.

"North Carolina has a strong legacy in manufacturing," said Governor McCrory. "Our talented and knowledgeable workforce is a top reason companies choose to locate in North Carolina. Cambro Manufacturing's announcement brings wellpaying manufacturing jobs to Alamance County."

The Cambro Manufacturing Company has been in business since 1951. From once offering a single product, the Camtray, 60 years ago, today Cambro offers a wide range of trays, table service and display items, storage, shelving, merchandising and insulated transport products.

The Cambro Manufacturing Company plans to develop up to 450,000 square feet of the land. The first phase will include purchasing 28 acres of land and building nearly 220,000 square feet with rail access to supply raw materials. Additionally, the company will add seven injection molding machines to produce plastic products.

"Manufacturing and health care are both important segments of our state's brand," said Secretary Decker. "We welcome Cambro Manufacturing to North Carolina and wish them continued success in Alamance County."
