New call center to bring 1200 jobs to Charlotte

The highly skilled workforce in the Charlotte area has helped attract an Orlando, Fla.-based company to locate a new facility in Charlotte and expand an existing facility in nearby Concord, both of which will result in approximately 1,200 new jobs coming to the region. Connextions Inc., a business that provides call-center services for major health-insurance companies, will locate a new facility at Charlotte's Forest Park business complex and will add 400 new employees to its existing facility in Concord. The announcement is the largest for the area so far in 2011 and is further proof that Charlotte has become a hub for call centers.

"We are excited that Connextions has chosen Charlotte. This four-year Inc 5000 winning firm has continued to invest locally, bringing jobs and economic growth to North Carolina for more than three years," said Kati Hynes, vice president of economic development of the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce. "Connextions' continued commitment to our state and their decision to bring additional jobs to our community during these challenging economic times demonstrates the excellent relationship fostered between our state and Connextions."

The facility at Forest Park will total 61,000 square feet and will generate 800 new jobs, both agent and management positions. Connextions is the latest call center operation to locate at Forest Park, which is home to call centers for the

Innovative small business award launched

On April 25, Governor Bev Perdue announced plans to honor communities across the state for the creative, innovative ways they help small businesses bring jobs to North Carolina. Two-thirds of all new jobs are created by small businesses, making them critical economic drivers for communities across the state.

"Small businesses are the backbone of North Carolina's economy and one of the reasons we are in the top ten states to improve our unemployment rate, which has dropped by nearly one-and-a-half points compared to where we were last February," said Perdue. "My goal for North Carolina is basic. We're going to continue to be the best place in the world to turn big dreams into jobs through innovation and by growing our small businesses."

The nomination period for the inaugural Governor's Innovative Small Business Community Awards is now open. Local governments are invited to submit nominations for efforts that reflect excellence in community economic development, small business and entrepreneurship, and sustainability. Main Street Grants create 260 jobs

Governor Bev Perdue announced April 21 that seven communities will receive more than \$969,000 through the state's Main Street Solutions Fund. The small businesses that benefit from the Main Street Solutions grants will create or retain a minimum of 119 permanent and 57 part-time jobs in addition to 84 construction jobs, according to the grant applications.

For every \$1 invested by the state, an additional \$4.21 will be invested by the local communities, bringing the total public/private investments to just over \$4 million. These funds will be used to provide direct support to North Carolina small businesses with revitalization activities that include commercial building rehabilitation, façade improvements, LEED certification energy efficiency and code improvements.

"Small businesses create more jobs than any other part of the economy, and we are helping to bring those jobs to our communities," Perdue said. "These grants will support some of the most creative and innovative economic development work being done today. Main streets can be at the heart of North Carolina's economic recovery with the right support and investment. The small businesses and other economic partners in our downtown areas will be stronger for this important investment."

Developing main streets in small towns is key to spurring economic growth in communities that have been hit hard by the global economic recession. The Main Street Solutions program helps increase economic activity through public/private redevelopment, historic preservation and small business assistance. The April 21 announcement is the second round of funding through the Main Street Solutions program. To date, the program has handed out nearly \$3 million in grants with an expected \$13 million in additional public/private investments.

Unilever to bring 65 jobs to Hoke County

Governor Bev Perdue on April 21 announced that Unilever, one of the world's largest consumer products companies, will expand its manufacturing facility in Hoke County with the creation of 65 jobs and an investment of \$35 million during the next three years in Raeford. The project was made possible in part by a \$195,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Martie Butler was the developer on this project.

"Our hard-charging job creation strategy is focused on more than bringing new companies into North Carolina," Perdue said. "Companies like Unilever that already have operations in North Carolina see that we are pushing policies that maintain our strong business climate, skilled workforce and excellent training programs. They feel at home expanding here."

Unilever's Raeford facility currently employs 275 and manufactures a mix of deodorants, body washes and shampoos under the brand names Dove, AXE, Caress, Suave and Degree for the North American market. The project will

Furniture maker to add 26 jobs in Burke County

Governor Bev Perdue on April 21 announced that Geiger International, a manufacturer of premium wood case goods, seating and occasional furniture for commercial and residential interiors, will expand in North Carolina with a new facility in Burke County. The company plans to create 64 jobs and invest \$3.7 million during the next three years in Hildebran. The project was made possible in part by a \$128,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Uconda Dunn was the developer on this project.

"North Carolina is known worldwide for manufacturing top quality furniture for the past century," said Perdue. "Geiger International recognizes that distinguished history, the importance of the furniture industry to the Hickory area and the top-ranked business climate we have built in North Carolina. Their expansion is great news for a community hit hard by the recession, and it is a validation of the policies we put in place to attract jobs to our state."

Geiger International is a subsidiary of Herman Miller, Inc., a globally recognized leader and innovator in furnishings for the office, home, healing and learning environments. The company's products are distributed in more than 140 countries and often sold through the architectural and design community. Geiger's current facility in Hickory has 24 full-time employees. This project will incorporate the Hickory operation in an updated and larger facility in Hildebran. Read more.

Warren County plans 'greentech' campus

<u>Warren County</u> officials have approved plans to create an agricultural biotechnology cluster of companies and support services on a 100-acre greentech business campus.

The campus itself will be green, the first agricultural biotechnology park in the nation powered completely by alternative energy sources – solar and biodiesel.

The new initiative, developed by the Warren County Economic Development Commission and approved by the County Board of Commissioners, seeks to capitalize on the agricultural, livestock, human and natural resources of Warren County and

Economic developers plan to attract eight to 12 agriculture and food-related companies over the next five years to create more than 900 jobs. Meanwhile, they have obtained private investment from regional livestock producers and consumers to fund a new certified humane advanced technology meat processing facility. It will be built on the site to serve existing markets and stimulate additional livestock production in north-central North Carolina and Virginia. The new processing plant, which could open in early 2012, would process beef, hogs, sheep and goats, creating 50 jobs in the plant and 500 jobs regionally in the livestock, agriculture supply and transportation industries.

NCMBC to host Federal IT Symposium

The N.C. Military Business Center will host the Second Annual North Carolina Federal IT Symposium on May 10 in Chapel Hill at The William and Ida Friday Center for Continuing Education. The symposium is designed to address the federal IT outlook in the face of budget cuts.

Companies looking to expand into the federal market will learn the steps needed to position their company to support the IT requirements of the federal sector. Topics will include advanced strategies for government sales, green IT, and gaming/simulation/training.

"The federal IT market is the world's largest consumer of IT. We have assembled a group of professionals that are prepared to present skills, tools, investment, time and effort needed for success," says Mickey Finn, senior consultant and owner of Cold Run Enterprises Inc.
