### Japanese Company Selects North Carolina

Governor Pat McCrory, N.C. Commerce Secretary John E. Skvarla III and the Economic Development Partnership of N.C. announced April 22 that CBC AMERICAS, Corporation will locate its U.S. headquarters in Wake County and open a distribution center in Alamance County.

The move will create 67 new jobs in Wake County and 29 new jobs in Alamance County over the next five years. The company plans to invest at least \$3.5 million.

"CBC AMERICAS is a welcome addition to our thriving community of Japanese businesses in North Carolina," said Governor McCrory. "North Carolina continues to gain a global reputation as a great location for international businesses."

CBC AMERICAS Corporation is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Japan-based CBC Co. Ltd., and part of a global network of import, export, trading, and distribution companies, strategically located throughout the world. The corporation is comprised of six business divisions: Imaging Technology, Optics, Chemicals & Pharmaceuticals, Flooring, Plastics and Eco-Energy. The company specializes in security solutions, chemicals and pharmaceuticals, renewable energy technology and video surveillance products.

"CBC AMERICAS will join North Carolina's diverse economy made up of companies from all over the world," said Secretary Skvarla. "Foreign direct investment continues to be an important piece of North Carolina's economic future and we gain a U.S. headquarters."

O'Neil Digital Solutions, LLC will open a new facility in Union County, creating 250 new jobs over the next five years. The company plans to invest \$90.7 million in the facility located in the town of Monroe.

O'Neil Digital Solutions, LLC is based in Los Angeles and provides print and mail services to customers throughout the country. The company was founded in 1973 by William J. O'Neil to produce time-sensitive investment research publications from his extensive database on publicly traded companies. Since that time, O'Neil has grown into a national provider of data-driven publishing and marketing communication services for major U.S. organizations. The Monroe location is being established to better serve the company's East Coast customers.

"We are very pleased to become part of the community of Union County and the city of Monroe," said Jim Lucanish, president of O'Neil. "One of the largest factors in our choice to come to North Carolina along with its location, and I know it's a cliché, but people make a business. And great people is what we found here."

The project was made possible in part by a performance-based grant from the One North Carolina Fund of up to \$2.25 million. The One NC Fund provides financial assistance, through local governments, to attract business projects that will stimulate economic activity and create new jobs in the state. Companies receive no money up front and must meet job creation and investment performance standards to qualify for grant

### New Round of Grants for Rural North Carolina

The North Carolina Rural Infrastructure Authority (RIA) approved 16 grants or loans on April 23, totaling more than \$4.7 million with the commitment of 392 new jobs.

<u>Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)</u>/loans approved include:

- City of Thomasville, Davidson County: \$120,000 loan for North American Implements Company to support the reuse of a vacant industrial building. The company will invest \$750,000 in the renovation and for new equipment and has committed to creating six new, full-time jobs.
- City of Thomasville, Davidson County: \$240,000 loan for Y&Y Hardwood Company to support the reuse of an industrial building vacant for ten years. The company will invest \$3 million in renovating and equipping the building, creating 12 new, full-time jobs.
- Town of Denton, Davidson County: \$131,250 to construct a pump station and sewer force main to allow Century Hosiery to expand at its current site. Century Hosiery has committed to creating 11 full time jobs at the Denton plant.
- Sampson County: \$500,000 to provide public sewer service to a proposed manufacturing plant to be constructed by Kansas City Sausage Company. The company has committed to creating 50 new full time at the new plant.

The Industrial Development Fund Utility Account grants approved include:

 Martin County: \$926,675 to assist with improvements to Everetts Industrial Park. The improvements would open five lots for companies to locate and serve as a catalyst for economic development.

#### Building Reuse Program grants/loans approved:

 Ashe County: \$500,000 to support the reuse of a building in Jefferson constructed in 1978 that has been vacant for more than four months. American Emergency Vehicles, a manufacturer of ambulances, will relocate from its current facility in an expansion creating 40 new, funds. These grants also require and are contingent upon local matches.

"North Carolina's strategic mid-Atlantic location and low cost of doing business help attract companies like O'Neil Digital Solutions," said North Carolina Commerce Secretary John Skvarla. "Our workforce is ready to get started in these well-paying jobs."

In addition to the N.C. Department of Commerce and the Economic Development Partnership of N.C., other partners that helped with this project include: North Carolina Community College System, Charlotte Regional Partnership, Monroe-Union County Economic Development, the City of Monroe, and Union County.

- City of Morganton, Burke County: \$212,500 to support the reuse of a building constructed in 1901.
   American Hospitality Furnishings is a manufacturer of custom furniture and will locate in the former Drexel Heritage Facility. The company has committed to creating 17 new, full-time jobs.
- The Town of Edenton (Chowan County): \$18,020 to support the reuse of a building constructed in 1985 and vacant for 18 months. Albemarle Urgent Care, Inc. is a new company providing urgent treatment for non-life threatening conditions. It has committed to creating two new, full-time jobs.
- Franklin County: \$500,000 to support the expansion of a building constructed in 1991 occupied by Palziv North America for the last five years. The company has committed to creating 40 new, full-time jobs.
- Hyde County: \$25,000 to support the reuse of a 1988 building vacant for 12 months. The 1718: Ocracoke Brewing Company, a craft brewery, will locate in the building with plans to create five new, full-time jobs.
- Martin County: \$220,000 to support the expansion of a building constructed in 1961 and occupied by Penco Products for the last 14 years. The company has committed to creating 22 new, full-time jobs.
- Stanly County: \$240,000 to support the reuse of a building in Albemarle constructed in 1980 and vacant for more than four years. Kraftsman, Inc., a manufacturer of landscape and equipment trailers, will locate in the building creating 20 new, full-time jobs.
- Surry County: \$80,000 to support the expansion of a building located in Mount Airy and occupied by Johnson Granite, Inc. for the last 11 years. The company has committed to creating eight new, full-time jobs.

#### **Economic Infrastructure Projects** approved:

- Cherokee County: \$71,678 to allow Peachtree Manor, Inc. to open an eighty (80) bed assisted living facility that will include a Special Care Unit for patients with Alzheimer's disease. The company has committed to creating 49 new, full-time jobs
- Gaston County: \$500,000 that will allow Tosaf USA, Inc. to open a facility in Gaston County. The Bessemer City facility will be its first entry into the U.S. market. Tosaf USA has committed to creating 60 new, full-time jobs over a two year period
- Sampson County: \$500,000 that will allow Kansas
   City Sausage Company, LLC, to expand its operations
   in Sampson County.

The RIA was established as part of the Rural Economic Development Division at the N.C. Department of Commerce to assist with the review and approval of grants for rural areas in the state. The grants-making programs of the division include assistance for building reuse and well as infrastructure, including water and sewer.
