Perdue announces 150 jobs with AptarGroup

Governor Bev Perdue announced May 16 that AptarGroup, Inc., a leading global supplier of customized dispensing systems (spray and lotion pumps, dispensing closures, and aerosol valves) for the beauty, personal care, pharmaceutical, household, food and beverage markets, will open its newest manufacturing facility in Lincolnton.

The company plans to create 150 jobs over the next five years with approximately \$50 million in capital investments in Lincolnton. The project was made possible in part by a state grant from the Job Development Investment Grant program.

"The fact that corporations continue to bring these kinds of projects to North Carolina proves that our investment in education and job creation is paying off," Perdue said. "These are the kinds of jobs that are helping our state steadily climb out of the recession, and we welcome international companies like Aptar that are willing to invest in our state and position North Carolina as a leader in business." <u>Read more</u>.

The Roberts Company to add 29 jobs in Pitt County

Governor Bev Perdue on May 13 announced that The Roberts Company, a provider of design, fabrication and installation services for the chemical, power, mining and pulp and paper industries, will expand with a new facility in Pitt County. The company plans to create 29 jobs and invest \$3.25 million during the next three years in Winterville. The project was made possible in part by an \$80,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Jason Semple was the developer on this project.

"The Roberts Company knows firsthand about our top-ranked business climate and skilled workforce, because the company has called North Carolina home for 34 years," said Perdue. "My top priority is creating jobs, and one of the best ways to do that is to fuel growth among the companies that are already here."

The Roberts Company works around the world for large heavy manufacturers and mining facilities to provide engineering, fabrication, construction and plant-start up services. The company specializes in fabrication and repair of complex ASME Code steel pressure vessels and heat exchangers. The Roberts Company has been in Winterville since 1986 and currently employs 460 in North Carolina. The company continues to grow and plans to open a second facility in Winterville.

N.C. ranks fourth as preferred summer travel destination

More Americans are planning to travel this summer despite rising gas prices, according to the latest American Express Spending & Saving Tracker (59 percent in 2011 vs. 51 percent in 2010). And North Carolina is expected to be the 4th Top U.S. Travel Destination, behind Florida, California and New York. Vacationing consumers plan to take an average of two week-long vacations, spending an average of \$1,200 per person, and three weekend-getaways with an average spend of \$300 per weekend. In addition, Americans with travel plans prefer quick getaways this summer to weeklong vacations (68 percent vs. 63 percent). Girlfriend getaways and "man"cations are on the rise compared to 2010 (15 percent compared to 10 percent). More than 40 percent of consumers said that getting a good deal on hotels, rental cars, flights, etc. is the most important factor in planning where they go for weekend getaways. Many also cited that they choose destinations based on where friends, family or significant others have decided (32 percent), diversity of activities (31 percent) and accessibility to a beach (29 percent). Research for the Tracker was completed online among a random sample of 2,025 consumers aged 18+. Read more.

Janesville acoustics to add 40 jobs in McDowell County

Governor Bev Perdue on May 11 announced that Janesville Acoustics, a leading supplier of acoustical and molded fiber products for the <u>automotive industry</u>, will expand their manufacturing facility in McDowell County. The company plans to create 40 jobs and invest \$1.5 million during the next three years in Old Fort. The project was made possible in part by a \$120,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Bill Payne was the developer on this project.

"North Carolina continues to draw national recognition as one of the best places to do business, for both companies looking to move here and businesses that already call our state home," Perdue said. "Helping North Carolina employers expand is a major component of our job creation strategy. Companies like Janesville Acoustics are deepening their roots and increasing their investment in the state because they have confidence in North Carolina's strong business climate, excellent workforce and custom training programs."

Janesville Acoustics' world-class manufacturing operations produce a diverse range of fiber based products, from die cut insulators, to various decorative components and molded fiber products. In recent years, Janesville Acoustics has further expanded its capabilities to provide complete molded carpet/floor systems and molded trunk systems. The company has grown to become an industry leader and known for its fiber expertise, manufacturing capabilities and innovative product solutions. The company plans to expand its current facility in Old Fort by 7200 square feet to accommodate more manufacturing space. Janesville Acoustics currently employs 111 workers in McDowell County.

Salaries will vary by job function, but the average annual wage for the new jobs will be \$32,750 plus benefits. The McDowell County average annual wage is \$29,224. <u>Read more.</u>

SBA and USDA increases continue through Q2

Continuing the trend of strong increases in government guaranteed loans, the Small Business Association and U.S. Department of Agriculture have posted an increased number of loans and loan volume for the first half of the 2011 federal fiscal year. The SBA increased the number of loans by 10 percent to 698, while the loan volume increased to \$281.9 million – a 64 percent increase over the same time period last year.

The USDA was affected by the late passage of the federal budget. While they had approved 24 loans totaling almost \$44.5 million, they had only received funding for 19 of those loans (\$39.7 million). The outstanding five loans were funded once the budget passed, and will be recorded as part of the third quarter. Including these 5 loans, the USDA loan volume increased 46 percent over the same time period last year.

The purpose of the "Platform" is to develop a new model to bring investment into North Carolina and to strengthen North Carolina's exports across all of the state's industry sectors. In addition, the Platform aims to create jobs, accelerate development of <u>life sciences</u> in North Carolina and China, and showcase North Carolina's global life sciences, technology, business and economic development.

The N.C. China Global Gateway Platform consists of the N.C. Department of Commerce, the North Carolina Biotechnology Center, Longistics, the North Carolina China Center, the China Investment Promotion Agency, <u>Calvert Research LLC</u> and <u>The</u> <u>Hamner Institutes for Health Sciences</u>, through the new Hamner-China Biosciences Center.

"We are excited about this partnership and the opportunities it will provide for our state's biotechnology and life science companies," said Norris Tolson, president and CEO of the North Carolina Biotechnology Center. "A facilitated introduction between companies in North Carolina and China is a significant advantage for companies in both locations."

"With this Platform, we hope to attract additional campus development funding, expand existing life science partnerships in China and gain access to novel life science technologies developed by Chinese companies associated with the Platform," said Dr. William Greenlee, president and CEO of The Hamner. "It is a major element of our global initiative plans that can benefit many Americans and Chinese in the process."
