Daimler trucks to hire nearly 700

Daimler Trucks North America on June 9 announced that it plans to sharply increase production and employment levels at its Mt. Holly truck manufacturing plant during the last half of 2011. In addition, over 120 shop and staff employees will be added at the company's Gastonia parts manufacturing plant.

Governor Bev Perdue issued the following statement on the announcement:

"Daimler Trucks' announcement today that they plan to hire nearly 700 new employees for their Mt. Holly and Gastonia operations is another terrific example of how our investments in education to build a trained, educated workforce have created a business climate attractive to global companies. Daimler is reaffirming and increasing its commitment to the state, knowing that they will find a workforce that is second to none."

This announcement comes a year after the company announced a major expansion at their Cleveland Truck plant in Cleveland, N.C.

Obama talks jobs in the Triangle

President Barack Obama visited the Triangle on June 13 with some of the nation's leading corporate executives in tow, pledging to find ways to accelerate job growth in an economy where high unemployment continues to be a drag on the recovery.

The president heard from a high-powered business group that recommended a series of steps designed to create a million more jobs during the next two years - from deregulation, to speeding up tourist visas, to encouraging construction for energy-efficient projects.

Perdue highlights education as key to N.C.'s manufacturing success

A different kind of manufacturing, fueled by North Carolina's emphasis on education, is helping drive the state's economy, Governor Bev Perdue told the Southern Growth Policies Board June 14 at its 2011 conference.

"I haven't had a conversation with a manufacturing business leader where they didn't ask about our education system in

Packaging maker to add 124 jobs in McDowell County

Governor Bev Perdue on June 9 joined executives from RockTenn, a leading integrated manufacturer of corrugated and consumer packaging and recycling solutions, in Marion to announce that the company will expand in McDowell County. RockTenn plans to create 124 jobs and invest \$23 million over the next 18 months, with a total investment of almost \$30 million after five years. The project was made possible in part by a \$372,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

"Growing corporations need trained, educated workers, and they know they can find them in North Carolina because of our long history of investing in education and job training,"Perdue said. "Those investments paved the way for RockTenn to bring new manufacturing jobs to an area hit hard by the economic recession. The company's commitment to McDowell County is another indication that the state and local economies are recovering."

RockTenn is a leading producer of corrugated and consumer packaging products, serving a broad range of market segments, in particular cosmetics, personal care, pharmaceutical, food and household goods. The company will expand its McDowell County operation by moving to a new facility in Marion. RockTenn and its subsidiaries currently employ 233 workers in McDowell County and over 1,000 throughout North Carolina. <u>Read more</u>.

<u>Company announces 124 new jobs (The McDowell News,</u> June 9) North Carolina," Perdue said. "Because manufacturing for us isn't just about furniture anymore - today it's about specialized airplane seats and aircraft components. We're not just making traditional textiles, we need folks today who can produce high-tech fabrics and lightweight components for wind turbines. Today, the jobs that come with these companies often require more than just a high-school degree."

North Carolina has been the most productive manufacturing state in the Southeast for over a decade. While the sector has been challenged by the recent recession, more than 430,000 people in North Carolina rely on a manufacturing job for their livelihoods. One in every five private sector jobs in rural North Carolina is in manufacturing.

Chinese delegation visits North Carolina

China is the world's fastest growing economy and second largest export market for North Carolina products. During the first quarter of 2011, state exports to China grew by 29 percent over last year. North Carolina exports a variety of goods and services to China, including electrical machinery and food products.

Viscotec celebrates 10-year anniversary

On June 8, the Viscotec Manufacturing Facility in Morganton celebrated its 10 year anniversary. Tatsuo Kawada, president of Viscotec's parent company, the Sieren Group of Japan, traveled to Burke County to participate in the event. During the ceremony, Morganton Mayor Mel Cohen, Kawada and N.C. Department of Commerce Deputy Secretary Dale Carroll planted a cherry blossom tree to commemorate the event. Viscotec employs 220 associates at the Morganton facility. The company, which is a supplier in the automotive industry to companies such as Honda and Toyota, has invested \$60 million over the past 10 years.

The event, secured by Visit Lake Norman, also is expected to generate 900 hotel room-nights, said Travis Dancy, Visit Lake Norman's sports marketing manager. Visit Lake Norman worked in on the state's workforce and education programs, a list of aerospace companies already located in the state, and the state's business incentives programs. May economic overview released

The N.C. Department of Commerce's Division of Policy, Research and Strategic Planning has released its economic overview for May 2011. Like most of this year, national and state indicators are generally positive this month but small in scale. Both the United States and North Carolina experienced unemployment rate decreases in March compared to February. The State added 2,900 nonfarm jobs in April with the statewide unemployment rate holding steady at 9.7 percent. The positives are tempered by a dip in consumer confidence and a struggling housing market at both the state and national levels. <u>Read the overview</u>.
