Medical device manufacturer selects Plymouth site

Micro Invasive Technologies, Inc. (MITI), a Connecticut-based medical device company, is relocating the company's manufacturing and research and development operations to Plymouth, according to a release by the Northeast Commission and the Washington County Board of Commissioners. The company anticipates it will train and hire as many as 40 workers within two years.

MITI is FDA-approved to manufacture and sell its DirectView ™ Minimally Invasive Laparoscopic 10mm System with disposable, interchangeable and angled Lightguides for Urology and General Surgery. Tideland EMC, through the USDA Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant Program, is providing financial assistance in the form of a loan/grant to support the project.

MITI will occupy the former Tideland Mental Health Center building during its first year of operation, and will then move to the Washington County Commerce Center at the Plymouth Municipal Airport once a new building is completed. A 20,000 sq. ft. building will be constructed at the Airport as an anchor to attract additional investment to Washington County.
