N.C. hosts life science executives at BIO 2011

As part of the N.C. Department of Commerce's ongoing program to market the state to <u>life science and biotechnology</u> decision makers, the Department is hosting the North Carolina Bio Reception tonight (June 28) in Washington D.C. The reception, one of the signature events each year at the BIO international convention and trade show, is made possible by the Friends of North Carolina organization. Governor Bev Perdue and Commerce Secretary Keith Crisco are expected to host more than 300 leaders from this vital business sector.

Commerce is also hosting visitors to the N.C. Pavilion, located in Booth 3519 at the Walter E. Washington Convention Center. More than 90 sponsoring companies are participating in this year's state pavilion, showcasing the many aspects of North Carolina's biotechnology, pharmaceutical and life sciences industry. Crisco and other Commerce officials will be meeting with company executives over the course of the four day conference. Planners from the Biotechnology International Organization expect over 15,000 executives will attend the convention which opened June 27.

Henderson County manufacturers participate in Regional Transportation Alliance

On June 1, more than 40 transportation and logistics professionals, representing companies from Henderson and Buncombe counties, convened for the Western North Carolina Transportation Alliance's Spring Meeting. Daniel Findley, a senior research associate at the Institute for Transportation Research and Education at N.C. State University, served as the keynote speaker. Findley has been involved in a recent project to develop a statewide logistics plan for North Carolina and is currently a member of the team working on the Seven Portals Study, a project designed to identify long-term economic, mobility and infrastructure needs for the state. As a specialist in transportationrelated infrastructure, Findley's past work has played a significant role in measuring the economic impact of North Carolina's transportation systems including highways, airports and ports. The number of young families in North Carolina's Triangle area is growing faster than anywhere else in the U.S. According to a recent study by *Forbes*, Raleigh has experienced the biggest increase over the last 10 years in adolescents ages 5 to 17. Charlotte ranked No. 4 in the U.S. for the fastest growth of young families. Both Raleigh and Charlotte were recently ranked as two of the fastest-growing cities in the U.S. by *Forbes*.

Forbes, in conjunction with demographer Wendell Cox, determined the regions with the most family growth by using data from the Census. <u>Read more</u>.

This year's SEUS-Canadian Provinces event took place in Fredericton, New Brunswick,

Niagara Bottling, LLC, a family-owned, private-label, bottled water manufacturer, is headquartered in Ontario, Canada. Since 1963, the company has grown to operate nine plants around the country. The company provides high-quality, low-cost bottled water for grocery, club store, convenience and wholesale customers. Niagara will open its tenth plant in Mooresville to serve the Mid-Atlantic region. N.C. 'clean energy' firms jump by 700 to 1,800 in less than year

Passage of the Renewable Energy & Energy Efficiency Portfolio Standard law in 2007 by the N.C. General Assembly and incentives from the federal government are helping create a growing "clean industry" in the state, according to the N.C. Sustainable Energy Association.

North Carolina is now home to 1,792 companies focused on renewable energy, and the state is the site for 1,829 renewable energy systems, according to a new report from the association.

The number of companies jumped from 1,100 last fall to nearly 1,800, based on data gathered by the group as of March. And these numbers could be low, according to the report's authors.

Below are year-to-date metrics tracked by the N.C. Department of Commerce's Division of

office recently visited several industrial sites in Western North Carolina. The group visited Ferncliff Industrial Park, located adjacent to the Asheville Regional Airport. The site has received the certified industrial site designation and is readily available for industry to locate. Ferncliff is an unique industrial park in that an agreement has been reached with the Asheville Regional Airport for "through the fence" access, so that industries that locate in the park will have immediate access to the airport and runway. That aspect of the park would be especially important for aviation companies or companies that have an air transport component to them.

The group also visited Davidson River Village in Transylvania County, formerly the old Ecusta Paper Mill. The 540-acre property was acquired by Renova Partners LLC and is now being redeveloped for retail, residential, hospitality, and industrial development as well as open public space. Buildings visited closer to Asheville included the headquarters facility for Volvo in Biltmore Park. The 40,000-square-foot shell building in Asheville Commerce Park was toured as well. It is located close to Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College. Situated on six acres, the building is expandable to 80,000 square feet and consists of 22-foot-ceiling height.
