

N.C. recognized as a leader in nanotech

North Carolina has been ranked the No. 8 state, and the Raleigh-Durham area the No. 4 metro in the nation, for nanotechnology activity, in a new study by the <u>Project on Emerging Nanotechnologies</u> (PEN). A national partnership between the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars and the Pew Charitable Trusts, PEN provides independent, objective knowledge and analysis to inform critical decisions affecting the development and commercialization of nanotechnologies.

The nanotechnology sector is expected to continue to grow rapidly in North Carolina. In a recent interview with Dr. Bill Friday on UNC-TV, Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco mentioned that he sees nanotechnology as an important area of focus for the Department of Commerce and North Carolina as a whole.

Nanotechnology is an area that Commerce's Office of Science and Technology has been emphasizing since at least 2006, when it released <u>A Roadmap for Nanotechnology in North Carolina's 21st Century Economy</u>. The office also maintains a clearinghouse of information on nanotechnology in North Carolina, <u>www.NCnanotechnology.com</u>. The office has an ongoing collaboration with nanotechnology companies, university research centers, and nonprofit organizations across the state. It hosted the <u>N.C. Nanotechnology</u> <u>Commercialization Conference</u> in Raleigh in March 2009. Another conference is being planned for spring of 2010.

Crisco speaks at Dallas event

To develop and sustain business relationships, the Friends of North Carolina program fully underwrote an Aug. 18reception and presentation for site selection consultants at the Nasher Sculpture Center in Dallas, Texas. Fifteen consultants met with Sec. Keith Crisco, representatives from the Business and Industry Division and other economic development leaders from across North Carolina. The consultants also received a copy of the Summer 2009 Commerce Update as well as parting gifts of pottery from the Seagrove area. Sec. Crisco offered remarks and an update on North Carolina's current economic development programs and activities

The event coincided with a business development mission that included 10 meetings with active prospects for economic development in North Carolina. These projects represent the potential for more than 6,000 jobs and nearly \$700 million in capital investment, and are important components of North Carolina's efforts to market itself as a premier business location.

Gov. Bev Perdue on Aug. 20 announced that Biotage LLC, a Swedish company that develops and manufactures instruments and consumables for pharmaceutical research, will relocate its United States headquarters to Charlotte. The company plans to invest in facility upgrades and create 21 new jobs in Mecklenburg County.

Biotage is a leading supplier of tools and technology for medicinal and analytical chemistry and process development. The company has offices in the U.S., the United Kingdom and Japan and employs nearly 270 workers worldwide.

The company is planning to move its U.S. headquarters from Virginia to North Carolina. Operations in Charlotte will include general administration, marketing and sales, and lab work for applications development, light manufacturing and distribution. Sun Edison to build solar farm

Sun Edison, a Maryland-based solar energy provider, has purchased a 356-acre tract of land in Davidson County in order to build the nation's largest photovoltaic solar farm, according to a release by the Davidson County Economic Development Commission (DCEDC).

In May of 2008, Duke Energy announced signed agreements with Sun Edison to purchase the entire output of the Davidson County solar farm. That agreement will run for 20 years. The solar farm is to begin production no later than December, 2010.

In one year of full production, the solar farm will offset 32,328,660 pounds of carbon dioxide. This is the equivalent of taking 3,168 cars off the road for one year. The estimated cost to construct the project is \$173,000,000. Construction on the site is to begin immediately.

DuPont brings \$55M expansion to Bladen

Gov. Bev Perdue on Aug. 20 announced that DuPont will add a new facility on a portion of its Fayetteville Works campus in Bladen County, creating 10 jobs and investing \$55 million during the next three years. The announcement of the new plant, which will make a key component in solar energy panels, was made possible in part by a \$50,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

DuPont employs 60,000 workers in 70 countries worldwide, including more than 900 at N.C. facilities in Fayetteville, Kinston and the Research Triangle Park. The new plant, in Bladen County near the Cumberland-Bladen County line, will produce polymer for DuPont ™ Tedlar® polyvinyl fluoride film used in the protective backsheets of photovoltaic solar panels. These panels convert light into electric power. The photovoltaic industry is experiencing worldwide growth as consumers turn to alternatives such as fossil fuels. This expansion will allow DuPont to keep pace with market expansion. The company expects overall sales of its family of products into the photovoltaic industry to exceed \$1 billion by 2012. Salaries for the 10 new skilled manufacturer positions will vary by job type, but the average annual wage will be \$36,278, not including benefits, more than the Bladen County average annual wage of \$25,792.

Aerospace contracts take off

North Carolina vendors have won more than 425 defense contracts worth more than \$4.7 million since June 2008, according to a joint statement by the N.C. Military Business Center (NCMBC), the N.C. Aerospace Alliance (NC-AA) and the GoldenLEAF Foundation.

While many industries are experiencing economic hardship, the aerospace industry is keeping pace in North Carolina, due to the shift from manufacturing for new aircraft to maintenance, repair and overhead for existing platforms. NCMBC, NC-AA, and GoldenLEAF are combining resources and connections to assist the state in building the aerospace industry in North Carolina. Part of this network connects the U.S. Dept. of Defense (DOD) aerospace industry needs with parts suppliers in North Carolina registered through the NC-AA's www.sourceNC.com Website.

New Phoenix Aerospace in Morrisville and VX Aerospace in Morganton are NC-AA members that have received loan capital from the Defense Venture Fund managed by The continue to make investments to expand our businesses and add jobs," said Sen. Indulor, a global leader in the design and manufacture of emulsion polymers and solid resins, recently held a ribbon-cutting to open its U.S. operations in Alamance County. The company, based in Germany, has purchased a 13.24-acre site in Graham and is creating 10 jobs in the near term, while planning to expand further in the next three years. Commerce's Dallas Hardenbrook was the developer on this project.

Program helps farmers add value

N.C. State University is partnering with the N.C. Tobacco Trust Fund Commission to launch the N.C. Value-Added Cost Share (NCVACS) program, which is designed to help farmers add economic value to their products. The program, funded with \$1.2 million from the commission, provides funding for feasibility assessment, business plan development and assistance with applications for the Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) awarded by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture (USDA). This grant helps farmers pay for professional services and equipment that will ultimately increase the value of their products.

The development of value-added agricultural operations is an emerging sector of North Carolina agriculture. The NCVACS program works hand-in-hand with the VAPG by reducing the costs associated with professional services and equipment
