Mayors forge biotech jobs plan

Winston-Salem Mayor Allen Joines led a biotech summit on July 29 at the Targacept headquarters at the Piedmont Research Park in Winston-Salem. Speakers included Lt. Gov. Walter Dalton and Deputy Commerce Sec. Dale Carroll. Carroll spoke on Gov. Bev Perdue's priorities for the green economy, defense supply chain, financial services, and life sciences. He gave examples of ways in which Commerce and the N.C. Biotechnology Center collaborate on life sciences projects throughout the state. Carroll also recognized Mayor Joines as the newly appointed Chair of the State of N.C. Economic Development Board.

Commerce strengthens trade ties with Canada

Canada continues to be North Carolina's largest trade partner. The second annual joint meeting of the <u>Southeast United States and</u> <u>Canadian Provinces Alliance (SEUS//CP)</u>, which took place July 26-28 in St. John's, Newfoundland, Canada, helped further strengthen the existing robust trade relationship.

Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco and International Trade Director Jean Davis attended the event in an effort to further cultivate and forge business relationships with Canadian officials and business leaders. After presenting remarks to the delegates at the opening ceremony, Sec. Crisco spent time with other heads of delegations from southeastern states, and also held private meetings with premiers and ministers from the participating Canadian provinces.

The 15-member North Carolina delegation included business leaders such as Chiyoko Lord who is vice president of business development with Pixon Imaging, LLC. North Carolina's booth provided businesses with an opportunity to network with Canadian business partners. North Carolina trade representative Russ Sawchuk assisted Pixon Imaging in setting up six appointments with Canadian buyers during the sessions. Next year's SEUS//CP conference will be held April from bench through commercialization, cell culture & upstream processing, and recovery & purification.

The week-long conference will also feature six keynote presentations, a Biospace Career Fair, a workshop entitled "Formulation Strategies for Protein Therapeutics," and three IBC Professional Training Academy courses. Attendees will be able to tour the biomanufacturing facilities of local firms Diosynth Biotechnology and Biogen Idec. From Oct. 13-15, conference participants may take part in an international exhibition with more than 150 suppliers and eight themed roundtable discussions. <u>Read more</u>.

Workforce promotes careers in advanced manufacturing

Regional workforce development boards in the Piedmont Triad region collaborated with the Piedmont Triad Partnership (PTP) to present ManufacturingWorks July 27-31. Eleven JobLink career centers were included in the tour, where representatives from industry and education answered questions about advanced manufacturing careers, skills requirements and educational needs for JobLink clients and staff.

"These information sessions will provide jobseekers with clear information and handson demonstrations of the skills and education required to pursue a career in this field," said Althea Hairston, director of Northwest Piedmont Workforce Development Board and member of the regional collaborative of workforce boards, TriadWorks.

Other partner workforce boards are: DavidsonWorks, Greensboro/High Point/Guilford, Pee Dee, and Regional. A total of 207 JobLink customers, 65 JobLink staff and 33 exhibitors participated in the tours. The Piedmont Triad Partnership (PTP), one of the state's seven economic development partnerships, is the lead organization for a first-generation Workforce Innovation in Regional Economic Development (WIRED) grant from the U.S. Department of Labor. Advanced manufacturing is one of the initiative's targeted industry clusters. The grant is administered through Commerce's Division of Workforce Development.



Ports to add biodiesel tanks

A Raleigh-based company will provide the N.C. State Ports Authority with three biodiesel storage tanks and fuel systems for operating equipment at the Ports of Wilmington and Morehead City. The Ports Authority has been working for several years to reduce its environmental footprint. In July 2007, the authority began using ultra low sulfur diesel as its primary off-road diesel fuel, three years Commerce's Policy Research & Strategic Planning Division has released its July Overview of North Carolina's Economy. - Unemployment rates increased nationally, but decreased slightly in North Carolina
- Employment continues to decline in most industry sectors
- Announced closing and layoffs are up from the previous month
- Foreclosures increased in June
- Gross sales and use tax collections were lower than
 previous month



Carroll promotes JobsNow during meeting

Deputy Commerce Sec. Dale Carroll was guest speaker at the summer meeting of the N.C. Association of Community College Presidents on July 30. More than 50 community college presidents participated in the meeting at Blue Ridge Community College. Carroll promoted the governor's JobsNow initiative, including the <u>"12 in 6" Training Pathways</u>, which is being implemented by community colleges across the state. The program, funded in part by Commerce's Division of Workforce Development, offers training programs in 12 high-demand jobs in six months or less. Carroll updated the association members on the federal recovery programs currently managed by Commerce.

Green business forum to be held in Lenoir

AdvantageWest and Appalachian State University are teaming up to present a free forum, "Re-Powering Our Region: Building Profit By Being Green," at the Broyhill Civic Center in Lenoir Aug. 7, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The forum will feature keynote speaker Harry Wingo, policy counsel in Google's Washington, D.C. office. Wingo focuses on cybersecurity, energy and other issues. Wingo will discuss Google's clean energy vision and address how both consumers and businesses can benefit from emerging technology.

The event will also feature expert panelists who will discuss responsible energy use, local and global perspectives on the green economy, the area's existing green businesses and various resources for education and economic development. The event is designed to connect business leaders, entrepreneurs, educators and policymakers to create a more before federal requirements. Two biodiesel tanks at the Port of Wilmington -- one 20,000gallon tank and one 10,000-gallon tank -- and one 10,000-gallon tank at the Port of Morehead City will be installed by Jones and Frank Corp. An N.C. Clean Air grant is funding \$104,000 of the \$126,000 cost, with Ports Authority revenues paying for the balance.
