Commerce, Monroe support aerospace sector

On Sept. 15, Commerce focused on the aerospace industry in Monroe. Deputy Commerce Sec. Dale Carroll and Senior Developer Rod Forsythe toured aerospace manufacturer <u>Turbomeca</u> (part of the French SAFRAN Group) and met with the City of Monroe Economic Development Advisory Committee. Carroll finished the community visit by serving as luncheon speaker at the Rotary Club in Monroe.

Perdue establishes offshore energy advisory panel

Gov. Bev Perdue on Sept. 21 announced the establishment of the Governor's Scientific Advisory Panel on Offshore Energy. The panel will thoroughly examine the state's offshore energy resources, including oil, gas, wind and other renewable resources, and will make recommendations to ensure that North Carolina's offshore resources are used for the benefit of all its citizens. The governor created the panel by signing Executive Order 23.

The panel will analyze and report on the feasibility of tapping offshore energy sources, and identify the benefits and areas of concern about these energy resources. Members will study current laws, rules, processes and procedures that affect the use of offshore energy resources, such as federal leasing programs, state and federal permitting programs, and local zoning and ordinances. Also, the panel will evaluate federal proposals to use North Carolina's offshore energy resources, including any proposals from the U.S. Minerals Management Service for offshore oil and gas lease sales. <u>Read more</u>.

State seeks return of Yadkin River flows, hydroelectic license

Gov. Bev Perdue on Sept. 21 announced that the State of North Carolina has filed <u>papers</u> with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) seeking return of the right to plan the use of the Yadkin River flows and the Yadkin hydroelectric project for the benefit of the people of North Carolina.

"Fifty years ago, we endorsed Alcoa's request for a federal license to operate hydroelectric dams because the project created jobs for up to 1,000 North Carolinians," said Perdue. "Today, those jobs are gone, and so is the reason for the license." <u>Read more</u>.

Crisco to celebrate Malt-O-Meal opening

The plant is the Minneapolis-based cereal company's first in the East, and will produce the Malt-O-MeaI Frosted Mini Spooners and Malt-O-MeaI Frosted Flakes brands of cereals.

During the opening, Malt-O-Meal will also announce its <u>Million</u> <u>Bowls</u> donation drive to benefit North Carolina food banks.

Malt-O-Meal received \$1.09 million in incentives from the state of North Carolina, and \$4 million from Randolph County. It also received an N.C. Dept. of Transportation grant to assist in building a railroad spur to the Asheboro facility.
