Celgard breaks ground on Concord plant

On Sept. 2, Celgard held a groundbreaking ceremony for its new electric drive vehicle battery separator manufacturing facility in Concord. The company and community officials recognized the leadership of Gov. Bev Perdue and her administration, along with the N.C. congressional delegation in competing for the \$100 million project. The company will create 209 jobs in Concord and 80 jobs in Charlotte. The project includes a \$49 million U.S. Dept. of Energy competitive grant award through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

The new plant is the second phase in Celgard's strategy to expand production capacity, while bolstering the development of a strong and viable U.S.-based supply chain for lithium-ion batteries used in EDVs. The first phase, begun earlier this year, included the expansion of the company's existing Charlotte SouthPoint facility. Read more.

Tourism staff responds to Hurricane Earl

The Division of Tourism, Film and Sports Development played a key role in the state's response to Hurricane Earl. Division staff worked closely with state officials to prepare for the storm by interfacing with the State Emergency Response Team. Staff also coordinated with tourism partners in the affected areas and provided hotel availability to evacuees. The Division team frequently updated travel advisories on Visitnc.com and provided operators at 1-800-VISIT-NC to answer traveler inquiries.

The Division stationed staff at Kill Devil Hills to work with the Outer Banks VB to directly contact and assist national and state media outlets that were covering the storm. They worked to ensure that media coverage was as accurate and balanced as possible, and were interviewed by the Weather Channel, NBC and numerous other state news outlets. Once the storm passed, the Division quickly communicated with travelers to let them know that is was safe to return to the coast for the busy Labor Day weekend.

Nanotechnology flourishes in N.C.

In an example of how innovation and technological advances can help spur economic recovery, nanotechnology is playing a role in creating jobs and commercializing new green technologies that will help consumers save energy. ARRA energy funds help create Elkin Center

N.C. Dept. of Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco and Assistant Sec. for Energy Jennifer Bumgarner were among those celebrating the opening of the Elkin Center at Surry Community College on Sept. 2. The center is housed in a former supermarket that was renovated with help from a \$200,000 Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant, using American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funding. The grand helped pay for energy-saving heating and air conditioning equipment, an energy management system, and to upgrade the roof and insulation.

Triangle Regional Film Commission launches

The Triangle Regional Film Commission will be up and running in early September. An expansion of the Durham Film Commission, which serves the 13-county region of the Research Triangle Regional Partnership, the Triangle Regional Film Commission will cultivate, promote and support production of motion pictures and television programs throughout the area.

The Durham CVB will provide office space and a variety of services to the commission in the beginning stages. While governed by a board of directors, long-time producer/director Rob Shoaf will serve as executive director. Sandy Freeman, a producer/director with The Freeman Group, and Carolyn Carney, director of visitor services of the Durham CVB and commissioner for the Durham Film Office, will round out the staff. The board of directors will initially include Thom Mount, president of WestMount Media and producer of the movie "Bull Durham"; Bob Chapman,

Nanoengineering, recently received both a One N.C. Small Business Program grant and a Green Business Fund grant. Both programs are administered by the N.C. Dept. of Commerce's Office of Science and Technology.

QuarTek has collaborated with Vesture, another Green Business Fund grantee, to launch a new company called Phase Change Materials. Phase Change Materials produces an innovative, green energy-saving nanomaterial that can be used in the foil lining of pizza delivery bags and fast food wrappers to better insulate food, as well as in homes. As a result of the innovation that was facilitated by the Office of Science and Technology grants, Phase Change materials has created 25 new jobs to date and anticipates a four- to five-fold growth in the next two years.

According to Reyad Sawafta, founder of QuarTek, the opening of the Joint School of Nanoscience and Nanoengineering in Greensboro means that companies like his can now benefit greatly from convenient local access to nanotechnology equipment, resources, and researchers. The school a partnership between N.C. A&T University and UNC-Greensboro, is one of the first institutions in the Southeast that will grant Ph.D. degrees in nanotechnology. The N.C. Office of Science and Technology's 2006 Nanotechnology Roadmap helped pave the way for the creation of the Joint School of Nanoscience and Nanoengineering.

In another sign that nanotechnology is playing a more prominent role in North Carolina's innovation economy, U.S. Rep. Brad Miller recently toured several North Carolina companies and research laboratories involved in nanotechnology, including the Joint School of Nanoscience and Nanoengineering, and One N.C. Small Business Program Grant recipient Protochips.

Merck to add 310 more jobs in Durham

Merck will add 310 more jobs to its promised 440 jobs at its Durham plant in the next two years, according to company officials. The company cites increased demand for its vaccine products.

Plant Manager John Wagner says he will need to hire 250 people before the end of 2011 to meet demand for popular vaccine products including the children's chickenpox vaccine Varivax. And Wagner told an audience at Triangle Business Journal's State of Durham symposium on Aug. 26 that he expects the Durham plant to grow to as many as 750 employees and an almost \$900 million investment by the end of 2012

Belgian mattress maker expanding in Triad

Bekaert Textiles, a Belgian mattress ticking manufacturer, is expanding its U.S. headquarters and production operation in Winston-Salem. The company has already added about 40 jobs over the past several months and plans to add another 20 jobs over the next year. Bekaert has completed the purchase of an 83,000 square foot facility at Union Cross Business Park that will increase the company's production and
