Perdue, Crisco to lead Asia business development trip

Gov. Bev Perdue and Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco will lead the state's Asia business development trip in October, Business leaders and regional economic developers will join the two as they meet with trading partners and recruitment prospects in China and Japan, North Carolina's second- and fourth-largest trading partners. Most of the costs will be paid by non-state funds.

"This trip is about building and sustaining relationships that create jobs for North Carolinians," said Gov. Perdue. "Doing business with Japan and China results in \$3.6 billion a year in trade, jobs for 20,000 North Carolinians and more than \$200 million in foreign direct investment."

The Asia trip is timed to coincide with the 33rd annual joint meeting of the Japan-U.S. Southeast Association (SEUS) and the Southeast U.S.-Japan Association, organizations that promote commerce between the region and Japan. The eight Southeastern member states -- Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia -rotate hosting the event, with North Carolina serving as the current U.S. host. More than 400 Japanese and Southeastern U.S. leaders are expected to attend the event, which returns to Tokyo this year after having met in Raleigh last October.

Clean-energy company to add 61 jobs

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Sept. 4 that <u>SCR-Tech LLC</u>, a leading national provider of cost-effective emissions control solutions for power plants, will expand and add an additional facility in Charlotte. The company plans to invest more than \$12.4 million over the next five years in capital and lease payments for the expansion and for new technologies. During the next three years, the company plans to create 61 new jobs in Mecklenburg County. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$90,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

The 61 new jobs will pay an overall average wage of \$49,372, not including benefits.

SCR-Tech is wholly owned by CoaLogix Inc., which provides innovative solutions for clean energy production with a focus on cost-effective emissions control solutions for the coal and gas-fired power generation industry. The company, with headquarters in Charlotte, currently provides selective catalyst reduction (SCR) regeneration technologies and SCR management services to reduce its customers' environmental footprint.

Project partners include: Mecklenburg County, the City of Charlotte and the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce. Commerce's Uconda Dunn was the developer on this project.

Commerce participating in China investment/trade fair

The China International Fair for Investment and Trade (CIFIT) is taking place Sept. 8-11 in Xiamen, China. Trade representative Marlinda Ma from Commerce's Shanghai office is attending.

CIFIT is currently China's only international investment promotion event aimed at facilitating bilateral investment. CIFIT is comprised of an investment and trade exhibition, an international investment forum and a series of seminars devoted to current issues in foreign direct investment. The event attracts investment promotion agencies from dozens of countries and regions to conduct investment briefings and showcase their business climate. Last year, CIFIT attracted 13,685 overseas visitors from 126 countries.

Six added to Main Street program

Six communities are the newest members of the Division of Community Assistance's Small Town Main Street program, an initiative for smaller cities that focuses on creating new jobs and investment by helping revitalize downtown areas. Robbins, LaGrange, Liberty, Selma, Waxhaw and Wilkesboro were selected from among 19 applicants across the state. Learn more.

August Economic Overview released

On Sept. 1, Commerce's Division of Policy, Research & Strategic Planning released its Economic Overview for August 2009. Most significantly, North Carolina's unemployment rate remained the same (11 percent) for the second month in a row. However, the fact that the rate remained unchanged is misleading because there was a 17,000-person decline in the size of the workforce. A large number of those who dropped out of the workforce are legitimately unemployed but are not counted as such because they have stopped looking for work.

Other findings in the overview:

- Non-farm employment declined significantly between June and July.
- The number of announced closings and layoffs were both down from the previous month.
- Foreclosures increased slightly in July; housing units authorized decreased significantly.
- Gross sales and use tax collections and highway use tax collections increased.

Workforce development program to expand to high schools

The Base Closure and Realignment Commission Regional Task Force (BRAC RTF) announced Aug. 31 that the N.C. Dept. of Commerce and the Division of Workforce Development (DWD) have awarded the BRAC RTF a grant totaling \$800,000 from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funds received by the state of North Carolina. This grant award is part of Gov. Bev Perdue's JobsNOW initiative.

"This funding will support the expansion of the All American Center for Workforce Innovation's pilot circuit concept and distributed learning network that connects educational institutions and business partners in the 11 counties," said Paul Dordal, executive director of the BRAC RTF.

The grant award expands the technology in 11 pilot high schools and includes a fixed i3D theater, SMART board, video telepresence, HD cameras, and connectivity with a distributive learning network via the Internet. The following high schools will be recipients of this technology: West Bladen, Pine Forest, Overhills, Hoke County, Southern Lee, East Montgomery, Union Pines, Richmond Senior, Lumberton, Lakewood and Scotland.
