Gov. Bev Perdue at the Cree announcement

Cree to add 575 green jobs

Durham-based LED lighting manufacturer Cree announced Oct. 8 that it will add 575 green jobs over the next three years, 275 of which will be added by the end of 2009. Gov. Bev Perdue was at the company for the announcement.

"Green jobs are a cornerstone of my vision for building a 21stcentury global economy in North Carolina," Gov. Bev Perdue said. "This job announcement fits perfectly with my plan to grow a world-leading green economy in North Carolina that turns green into gold for decades to come."

Cree has also begun manufacturing and assembling LED lighting products with Flextronics in Mecklenburg County.

"We are seeing tremendous growth for LED lighting," said Cree CEO Chuck Swoboda. "Energy-efficient lighting has its roots right here in North Carolina, and Cree is proud to be bringing more green jobs to our state."

Cree's industry-leading line of LED lights, including recessed downlights and troffer replacements, began North Carolina production in August 2009.



Pamlico Sound towers to test wind energy

Duke Energy and UNC-Chapel Hill are working out the details of a contract to develop wind as an energy source off the coast of North Carolina. A test program would build one to three wind towers in Pamlico Sound. University researchers would use the program to test the towers' impact on the environment among other issues. Gov. Bev Perdue was quoted in the Sept. 26 edition of The News & Observer as telling a gathering of a few hundred beach dwellers in Buxton that North Carolina has a chance to be a "global leader in green energy." Perdue stressed that green energy would help the environment and create jobs.

Crisco helps celebrate NetApp expansion

Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco on Oct. 7, helped dedicate a \$65 million computer center in Research Triangle Park for NetApp, a California-based data storage provider.

The storage and data management solutions company said the center will allow for significant savings due to its efficiencyfocused design. The RTP facility has been online since April but the company held an official grand opening ceremony Oct. 7. In 2007, the state announced a Job Development Investment Grant for NetApp's expansion project, expected to create 646 new jobs and invest \$41.5 million over 10

Israeli fiber company brings \$17 Million Investment to Granville County

Gov. Bev Perdue on Oct. 12 announced that Shalag Industries Ltd., an international supplier of nonwoven fabrics used in the hygiene and wipes markets, will open a new plant in Granville County. The company will invest more than \$17 million and create 42 jobs in Oxford. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$110,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

"North Carolina is home to more nonwoven textile plants than anywhere else in the United States, and the U.S. is home to more nonwoven textile plants than anywhere else in the world," Perdue said. "Our business-friendly policies, superb quality of life and skilled, productive workforce are helping companies build success in our state."

Shalag Industries, headquartered in Upper Galilee, Israel, produces nonwoven fabrics primarily from polypropylene, polyester and viscose fibers. The fabric is used in the production of dry and wet wipes, diapers and personal hygiene products. The company's major customers include Johnson & Johnson, Nicepak and Kimberly Clark. Commerce's Dallas Hardenbrook was the developer on this project. Read more.

Parachute maker brings 375 jobs to Person County

Gov. Bev Perdue on Oct. 6 announced North American Aerodynamics Inc., a national manufacturer of parachutes for military and sports uses, will expand in Person County. The company will invest nearly \$900,000 and create 375 jobs in Roxboro. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$300,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

North American Aerodynamics Inc., a privately held company founded in 1964, produces the globally distributed Parafoil Accuracy Parachute Canopy and parachutes for the sports and military sectors. The company currently has 45 employees, along with 55 seasonally furloughed workers, at its headquarters and manufacturing facility in Person County.

The company, which recently secured a new military contract, plans to expand and renovate two existing nearby buildings to meet increased manufacturing demands. The expanded production will include cutting, sewing and assembly of cargo and flare parachutes for military operations in Afghanistan. The 375 new jobs will pay an annual average wage of \$23,834. Commerce's Bernard Torain was the developer on this project. Read more.
