### Perdue discusses Asia mission in TV interview

Gov. Bev Perdue sat down for an interview with Kim Genardo of Raleigh NBC affiliate WNCN (NBC17) to discuss the expected benefits from the recent mission to Japan and China. In the interview, Perdue said that the visit to Tokyo was important because it allowed her to meet with established business partners developed by former Gov. Jim Hunt. She said Japanese businesses and officials appreciated the fact that a current governor was checking on them. The China portion of the trip was especially important because it allowed North Carolina to establish new relationships in a fast-growing economy.

"My goal is for North Carolina to be a global player and this is one of the ways to make it happen," said the governor. See video of the interview.

#### Fearrington House, **Umstead continue 5** Diamond rating

The Fearrington House Country Inn in Pittsboro and the Umstead Hotel and Spa in Carv have again won AAA 5 Diamond Lodging ratings for 2010. The Fearrington House Country Inn has maintained the rating for 16 consecutive years. The restaurant in the Inn has maintained the AAA 5 Diamond Restaurant rating - the only one in North Carolina - for 15 consecutive years. #### Five communities to receive housing development funds

Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco on Nov. 4 announced that five North Carolina communities will receive \$1.23 million in Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Tax Credit Housing Development funds to provide housing and related needs for low- and moderate-income residents.

The CDBG funding awards will assist in constructing 245 affordable housing units and supporting infrastructure for the projects, including safe water and sewer lines, road improvements and sidewalks. The grants range from \$240,000 to \$250,000. The funding is awarded to local governments to strengthen neighborhoods, rehabilitate homes and address critical infrastructure needs in a community.

### Rural leaders discuss the future at forum

More than 550 leaders from rural areas of the state gathered Nov. 5-6 for the annual Rural Partners Forum, sponsored by the N.C. Rural Center, at the North Raleigh Hilton. The theme of the forum was "Funding Our Rural Future," and topics included community-based philanthropy, and recession and recovery in rural areas. Gov. Bev Perdue spoke on Nov. 5 and also recognized Tim Will of farmersfreshmarket.org, a virtual farmers market. Will recently won the Purpose Prize and \$100,000 for social innovators over 60 who do good things in their "encore" careers. Other speakers included Brian Dabson, president and CEO of the Rural Policy Research Institute, Lt. Gov. Walter Dalton and Freddie Killough of the N.C. Small Town Economic Prosperity Program.

# **Textile company adds 135 jobs in Richmond County**

Gov. Bev Perdue on Nov. 9 announced that Richmond Specialty Yarns, a manufacturer of fiber-based yarns for the textile industry, will expand in Richmond County. The company plans to create 135 new jobs and invest \$1 million during the next three years. In addition, the project will help the company retain 140 existing jobs. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$150,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. Commerce's Martie Butler was the developer on this project.

"North Carolina maintains its strong ties to the textile manufacturing industry," Gov. Perdue said. "Our highly skilled workforce and business-friendly policies continue to support and attract growing companies, like this one, which are adapting for success in a global market."

Richmond Yarns Inc. is a fiber-based yarn company with its headquarters and manufacturing facility in Ellerbe. FilSpec Inc., a yarn-spinning company based in Canada with clients worldwide, has purchased a controlling interest in Richmond Yarns, which will be renamed and expand operations at its Ellerbe site to serve new markets.

The new company, Richmond Specialty Yarns LLC, will produce specialized yarns from fibers and fiber blends to serve the military, medical, protective wear, marine, upholstered furniture and other markets. Salaries for the 135 new jobs will vary by job function, but the overall annual average wage will be \$25,931, not including benefits.

"North Carolina citizens from all walks of life share a basic need for safe, accessible housing," Crisco said. "We are committed to improving conditions for our needy residents and doing our utmost to improve the quality of life for all North Carolinians." Read more.

### Carroll speaks at Turkington plant opening

Commerce Deputy Sec. Dale Carroll was on hand Nov. 5 for the official opening of the new Turkington USA plant in Clayton. The privately owned British company, which previously was located in Goldsboro for 27 years, designs, manufactures and installs custom built automated equipment for industrial bakery industry. Some of Turkington's clients include Pepperidge Farm, Sara Lee and Interstate Bakeries. The Town of Clayton was awarded a \$324,000 Building Reuse grant from the Rural Economic Development Center to help Turkington Industries renovate an existing building.

DPE Investments of Charlotte created the master plan for the 32-acre, \$35 million site, which will include commercial space, a convenience store, office buildings, two hotels and three ponds. #### October economic overview released

On Nov. 3, Commerce's Division of Policy, Research & Strategic Planning released its Monthly Overview of North Carolina's Economy for October, 2009. North Carolina's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained the same at 10.8%. While North Carolina's unemployment rate has remained relatively constant since February 2009, the labor force has contracted by 50,000 people between February and September 2009. Read the overview.

- Nonfarm payroll declined slightly; construction employment increased for second month in a row
- Announced business closings and layoffs are at their lowest levels in over a year
- Number of foreclosures decreased in September
- · Retail sales and highway use tax collections declined
