



Smithfield Foods to bring 330 jobs to Kinston

Governor Bev Perdue on Nov. 10 announced that Smithfield Packing Company, a subsidiary of Smithfield Foods Inc., a \$12 billion global food company and the world's largest pork processor, will expand its facility in Lenoir County. The company plans to create 330 new jobs and invest \$85.5 million during the next three years in Kinston. The project was made possible in part by a \$700,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. As part of the expansion in Kinston, the company will add a new product line of packaged meats. Smithfield Foods currently has more than 12,400 employees across North Carolina.

"Creating jobs is my top priority," Perdue said. "North Carolina is an ideal location for global manufacturers to expand. Our skilled workforce, job training programs, commitment to success of agribusinesses and our excellent business climate are drawing more and more companies here."

Smithfield Packing Company, which operates the existing Kinston facility, was founded in 1936. Primary lines of business include fresh pork, smoked meats, bacon, cooked hams, and hot dogs for retail, foodservice and deli channels. The company exports products to approximately 30 countries. In addition to the Smithfield brand, its Gwaltney, Esskay and Cumberland Gap products are among the leaders in their respective markets. <u>Read</u> <u>more</u>.

Steel processor to add 23 new jobs in Guilford County

Governor Bev Perdue on Nov. 14 announced that Coilplus Inc., a flat rolled steel processor in Guilford County, plans to create 23 new jobs and invest \$12.7 million during the next three years in Greensboro as part of an expansion in North Carolina. The project was made possible in part by a \$50,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Jan Critz was the developer on this project.

"Creating jobs is my top priority, both attracting new companies to North Carolina and helping existing ones grow and thrive," Perdue said. "North Carolina remains an ideal location for global manufacturers to expand. Our skilled workforce, job training programs and excellent business climate are known worldwide."

Coilplus started in 1985 in Alabama and has grown to nine plants throughout the United States and two locations in Mexico. Coilplus is part of the global network of Metal One, owned by Mitsubishi and Sojitz Corporations. Coilplus currently has 41 employees at its facility in Greensboro. As part of the expansion in Guilford County, the company will add new state-of-the-art equipment and will double the square footage of the existing plant. <u>Read more</u>. State ports show revenue growth

A rising tide of cargo has lifted all ports in North Carolina, according to an announcement Nov. 10 by the N.C. State Ports Authority. The agency said that all of its port facilities combined logged a 7 percent revenue increase for the first quarter of FY 2011-12, which began July 1, over the same period last year.

The Port of Wilmington showed a cargo growth rate of 11 percent in general terminal activities and a 2.5 percent increase in container volumes. Increases in grain and woodchip shipping were primary factors in Wilmington's 23 percent growth in bulk commodities. Break bulk cargo – cargo that is shipped in individual containers rather than in bulk – showed a slight decline over last year.

"The authority's profitability during particularly difficult economic times is due to our vigorous pursuit of new business opportunities and the commitment of <u>N.C. Ports</u>' employees and partners," said N.C. State Ports Authority CEO Tom Eagar. "We continue to read the world's economic market and adjust plans accordingly. In the meantime, we are working closely with our current customers to ensure their needs are consistently met."

Eagar said the authority expects second quarter results to continue the upward trend in volumes and revenues.
