Talecris to expand facilities in Clayton

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Nov. 13 that international biopharmaceutical company Talecris Biotherapeutics is expanding its manufacturing facilities near Clayton, creating 259 new jobs over the next seven years and investing \$268.7 million. The announcement was made possible in part by state Job Development Investment Grant and One North Carolina Fund awards and is contingent upon approval of local incentives. Commerce's Dallas Hardenbrook was the developer on this project.

"The competition for these types of jobs is fierce," Perdue said. "The fact that Talecris has found the tools it needs to succeed in North Carolina shows why this state's business climate is consistently named as the best in the nation."

Talecris Biotherapeutics discovers, develops and produces critical-care treatments for people with life-threatening disorders in the areas of immunology, neurology, pulmonology and hemostasis. The company employs about 4,700 worldwide with headquarters in the biotech hub of Research Triangle Park. With more than 1,800 full-time workers currently employed in Johnston County, Talecris is one of the county's largest employers and a Top 10 employer in RTP.

Talecris has remained committed to North Carolina as it has grown, adding more than 200 jobs in the state in 2009 alone. The 259 new jobs that will be created in Johnston County will pay an overall average annual salary of \$51,066, not including benefits, which is higher than the Johnston County average of

Perdue names Energy Policy Council members

Gov. Bev Perdue on Nov. 13 announced appointees to the North Carolina Energy Policy Council. The council was reorganized during the past legislative session as part of Perdue's strategy to make North Carolina a leader in green economy jobs by strengthening state leadership in energy policy and making smart investments to create green jobs and foster innovation. The council will hold its first meeting on Nov. 18, at the offices of Advanced Energy on the N.C. State University Centennial Campus.

The law requires that Perdue's appointees come from specific sectors of the state's energy economy, as follows:

- Electric power industry: George Everett, Raleigh -Duke Energy
- Natural gas industry: George Baldwin, Charlotte -Piedmont Natural Gas
- Energy policy matters: Jo Anne Sanford, Raleigh -Sanford Law Offices
- Alternative fuels and biofuels: Steven Burke, Oxford -Biofuels Center
- Energy efficient building design or construction: Tim Toben, Chapel Hill - Greenbridge Development
- Environmental protection: Michael Regan, Raleigh -Environmental Defense Fund
- Providing renewable energy services: Marcus Wilhelm, Chapel Hill - Solar Tech South
- Renewable sources of energy: Simon Rich, Edenton -Fugua Rich Weeks LLC
- County or city commissioner: Rodney W. Locks -Brevard City Council
- Development of energy-related businesses: Henry McKoy, Durham - Fourth Sector Financial
- Low-income residential weatherization: Reginald Speight, Williamston - Martin County Community Action
- Petroleum industry: Kevin Garrison, Concord South Central Oil Company

Appointed by Senate President ProTem Marc Basnight are Sen. Ellie Kinnaird, D-Orange and Sen. Richard Stevens, R-Wake. Appointed by House Speaker Joe Hackney are Rep. Angela Bryant, D-Nash and Rep. Pricey Harrison, D-Guilford.

Keith Crisco announced appointments resulting from the consolidation of the state's energy programs into the Commerce Department: Larry Shirley has been named to the newly created post of director for the development of the green economy, and Ward Lenz, most recently energy program director at the nonprofit Advanced Energy Corp., has succeeded Shirley as director of the State Energy Office. American Truetzschler celebrates 40th anniversary

Commerce Deputy Sec. Dale Carroll spoke at the 40th anniversary celebration of textiles manufacturer <u>American Truetzschler</u> in Charlotte Nov. 3.

The German company located its U.S. headquarters in Charlotte in 1969, one of the earliest German investments in the state. The Charlotte headquarters now employs nearly 150 people.

The company originally made textile machinery including spinning machines and machines to prepare the yarn before spinning. They now specialize in machinery that prepares fibers of all kinds to be spun, woven or placed in non-woven fabric producing machinery.

N.C. Film Council reestablished

Gov. Bev Perdue on Nov. 12 signed an Executive Order reestablishing the N.C. Film Council at a ceremony at EUE Screen Gems studios in Wilmington, home to the largest studio lot east of California. The N.C. Film Council advises the governor on film industry matters and serves as a forum for film-making concerns and recommendations. Read more

In addition to reestablishing the council, the new executive order will add duties for council members:

- Assist in ongoing development and growth of the N.C. film industry.
- Support fiscal incentives that help North Carolina remain competitive in recruiting films.
- Assist in developing a marketing strategy for the N.C. Film Office.
- Monitor the North Carolina film industry and assist in developing protocol to measure filmmaking activities in North Carolina.

Perdue promotes jobs initiative in Rocky Mount

Gov. Bev Perdue promoted the JobsNOW 12-in-6 initiative during a visit to Nash Community College in Rocky Mount on Nov. 10. Perdue met with officials and students and heard their feedback on the program, which was launched in April to help job seekers find a new career path in six months.

The N.C. Community College System and the N.C. Department of Commerce are collaborating on the program as part of Perdue's larger JobsNOW initiative, which focuses on job creation and economic development. The new training programs are available at all 58 community colleges. The state's 24 workforce boards, JobLink Career Centers and Employment Security Commission offices will connect job seekers with the training programs and employment opportunities.
