

Electrolux to create at least 738 jobs in **Mecklenburg County**

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Dec. 16 that appliance manufacturer Electrolux expects to create a minimum of 738 jobs over the next five years and invest \$8.3 million in a new North American headquarters in Charlotte. The announcement was made possible in part by a state Job Development Investment Grant and a One North Carolina Fund award. Commerce's Susan Fleetwood was the developer on this project.

Electrolux is a global leader in home and professional appliances whose products include refrigerators, freezers, washers and dryers, vacuum cleaners, dishwashers and cooking products sold primarily under the Electrolux, Frigidaire and Eureka brands in North America. Electrolux North America is owned by AB Electrolux, a company based in Stockholm, Sweden, that employs 55,000 workers around the world.

The company will consolidate corporate offices from around the country into the new Charlotte headquarters. Electrolux currently employs around 650 people in North Carolina, the majority at a dishwasher manufacturing plant in Kinston. The new jobs created by the company will result in an overall annual payroll in excess of \$60 million a year not including benefits. Read more. Hear audio from the press conference,

Deutsche Bank opens Cary Office

Deutsche Bank, in conjunction with the State of North Carolina and the Town of Cary, marked the grand opening of a new technology development center in Cary on Dec. 14. The facility, located at 3000 Centre Green Way, will operate as DB Global Technology (DBGT), a newly formed subsidiary, and will develop a range of leading-edge applications and software solutions for many of Deutsche Bank's businesses.

The bank expects to create more than 300 full-time jobs at the facility within the next five years and will draw from information technology professionals in the Raleigh-Durham area in addition to graduates from local universities. The facility will be run by John Eagleson, Chief Operating Officer of DBGT Cary.

Gov. Bev Perdue and Cary Mayor Harold Weinbrecht, presided over a formal ribbon-cutting ceremony, along with Deutsche Bank's CIO of Global Debt, Sales and Research for Global Information Services-Capital Markets, Mark Ashton-Rigby.

Perdue announced in August that DB Global Technology had been awarded a Job Development Investment grant to make this project possible.

Based in Ontario, the company currently employs more than 150 workers and makes veneer storage cabinets, dressers, shelves, computer desks, TV stands, partitions and many other products. Talon products are sold in Costco, Lowes, Ikea, Home Depot, Sears and other retail outlets in the U.S., Canada and Mexico.

Lab equipment maker adds 104 jobs in Buncombe

Gov. Bev Perdue on Dec. 15 announced that Thermo Fisher Scientific, a world leader in laboratory equipment and services, will expand its operations in Buncombe County. The company will create 104 jobs and invest nearly \$5 million during the next three years at its site in Asheville. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$208,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. Commerce's Bill Payne was the developer on this project.

he company employs approximately 35,000 people in 40 countries, serving 350,000 customers primarily in the life sciences and health care markets.

Thermo Fisher's Asheville site, which manufactures cold storage equipment, centrifuges and ovens for medical and research laboratories, is expanding to accommodate new product lines. Salaries for the new jobs will vary by job function, but the overall annual average wage will be \$40,811 not including benefits, higher than Buncombe County annual average wage of \$32,968.

Perdue reestablishes N.C. Commission on Volunteerism and Community Service

Perdue calls on federal government to ease credit for small businesses

Gov. Bev Perdue on Dec. 18 called on North Carolina's congressional delegation to support steps to ease the credit crisis facing North Carolina's small businesses. Gov. Perdue's #1 priority is creating jobs in North Carolina, and helping small businesses grow is critical to creating jobs.

"Small businesses are the backbone of North Carolina's economy," said Perdue. "It is critical that we get credit flowing back to small businesses to work our way out of this economic and financial crisis." Read more.

In a letter to the N.C. congressional delegation, Perdue asked for federal government support for North Carolina's efforts to increase lending to North Carolina small businesses. Specifically, the federal government should:

- Identify sources of capital, such as unspent TARP funds, that can be repurposed and deployed through banks specifically for small business lending.
- Extend the availability of 90% no fee SBA-backed small business loans, and ease the regulatory pressures applied to lenders to bring credit access back within reach of the many viable businesses that need it.
- Consider tax incentives for small businesses that create jobs as a result of federally-backed loans.

Green Business Fund issues RFP

The 2010 N.C. Green Business Fund call for proposals is now open. The fund is a competitive grants program established by the state in 2007 and administered by Commerce's Office of Science and Technology.
