

Crisco appointed Commerce secretary

Governor-elect Bev Perdue on Jan. 5 announced cabinet secretaries and leadership appointees to help direct North Carolina's economic development departments. Among the appointments were Secretary of Commerce and Deputy Secretary of Commerce.

"Each of the leaders who joined my administration today will play a key role in our efforts to create jobs and grow our economy," said Governor-elect Bev Perdue.

The Commerce appointees are: Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco -- Secretary of Commerce and Commerce Deputy Sec. Dale Carroll.

Business-Support Network launched

Business Link North Carolina, a comprehensive business-support network designed to assist North Carolina companies, was launched Jan. 7. BLNC, or "blink," offers quick access to a wide range of information and resources available from statewide, state-supported agencies and organizations. A Web portal, <u>www.blnc.gov</u>, and a toll-free number, 800-228-8443, link users to the resources.

In addition to Commerce, BLNC participants include: the Small Business Center Network of North

Carolina's Community Colleges; Employment Security Commission of North Carolina, N.C. departments of Agriculture & Consumer Services, Revenue and Secretary of State; N.C. Biotechnology Center; N.C. Community Development Initiative; N.C. Institute of Minority Economic Development; N.C. Rural Economic Development Center; and the University of North Carolina System, including the Small Business and Technology Development Center and N.C. State University's Industrial Extension Service.

Perdue announces launch of redesigned tourism Web site

Gov. Bev Perdue on Jan. 14 announced the launch of the state's newly redesigned tourism Web site, <u>www.VisitNC.com</u>. The site, which is run by Commerce's Division of Tourism, Film and Sports Development, is aimed at today's sophisticated Web user who can customize the site's content and connect to more than 16,000 travel-related businesses, attractions and events across the state.



Minges promoted to assistant secretary

Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco announced Jan. 16 that Lynn Minges has been promoted to assistant secretary for Tourism, Marketing and Global Branding. In the expanded role, Minges will continue to lead the development and marketing of the state's tourism, film, sports and wine industries, but will also help position the state as the preferred location for domestic and international business.

Minges, who has been with Commerce for nearly 16 years, was tasked with consolidating marketing and promotion functions within the department to brand the state in a unified manner and to position North Carolina globally as a premier travel and business location.

Port of Wilmington to offer direct connection to Central America markets

The Danish container shipping company, Maersk Line, announced Feb. 3 that it will begin weekly vessel calls effective Friday, March 6, between the Port of Wilmington and Puerto Cortes, Honduras, and Santo Tomas, Guatemala, with over-the-road service to El Salvador and Nicaragua. Maersk Line is the world's largest container shipping company and has a significant regional office in Charlotte.

Perdue announces 120 jobs in Forsyth County

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Feb. 9 that Piedmont Aviation Component Services LLC, a provider of aircraft maintenance services and sales, plans to expand its operations in Kernersville. The company plans to invest \$5.8 million and create 120 jobs this year by relocating sister company Limco to North Carolina. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$44,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

The 120 new jobs will pay an average of \$44,805 a year, not including benefits. This is more than the Forsyth County annual average wage of \$39,936.

Gov Perdue announces library-based "JobSearch Help Desk"

Gov. Bev Perdue on Feb. 13 announced the JobSearch Help Desk, which will train librarians to help patrons connect with employers and conduct job searches at public libraries. Partners in the project are the State Library at the Department of Cultural Resources, the Employment Security Commission and the Department of Commerce.

Davidson County manufacturer to add 328 jobs

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Feb. 18 that ASCO Power Technologies plans to add 328 jobs over the next five years at its Welcome manufacturing operations. The company, which will invest \$11.4 million to expand

the Davidson County facility, is a world-leading manufacturer of power switching and control products designed to ensure reliable back-up electrical power for critical operations.

ASCO Power Technologies is a subsidiary of Emerson, a global manufacturing and technology company whose 2009 first quarter sales exceeded \$5 billion. ASCO's products include automatic transfer switches and power systems that protect hospitals, data centers and telecommunications networks.

The company currently employs 211 people in North Carolina: 190 at the Welcome manufacturing plant and 21 at a Cary sales office. The 328 new workers will be paid an average annual wage of \$43,924, not including benefits, by the time all the employees are hired in 2013. (The average will be lower during the first few years of the hiring process.) Davidson County's average yearly wage is \$29,432.

One Tree Hill becomes state's longest running series

The CW Network decided to film a seventh season of the Wilmington-based drama series "One Tree Hill," making it North Carolina's longest running TV series. The show has generated more than \$135 million to date in estimated spending in North Carolina.

"This is great news for Wilmington and for North Carolina," said Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco. "This decision to continue filming for another season means that the state will continue to benefit from more than 125 long-term jobs brought in by our film industry."



N.C. tourism industry rallies in Raleigh

More than 600 tourism, business and government leaders from throughout North Carolina participated in the 2009 N.C. Governor's Conference on Hospitality & Tourism at the Raleigh Convention Center, which wrapped up March 3. Gov. Bev Perdue addressed the conference on March 2 and commended travel industry leaders for their work and commitment to marketing North Carolina as a premier travel destination. She noted that even as consumers across the United States were


traveling less, North Carolina picked up market share, and improved its rank among other states to move from the seventh to sixth most visited state in the country. On March 17, Gov. Bev Perdue released her <u>proposed budget</u> for the next fiscal year, which includes a \$7 million investment in the Main Street program, and \$5 million for the Green Business fund to encourage the growth of businesses developing green technology. State grant helps GMAC expand in Charlotte

Gov. Bev Perdue announced March 20 that GMAC Financial Services will grow its Mecklenburg County operations and invest more than \$16.4 million, including capitalized lease payments, for an expanded corporate center. The Charlotte expansion is expected to create 200 finance, marketing, IT and related jobs



over the next two years that will pay an average annual wage of \$96,124, not including benefits.

The state's Economic Investment Committee voted unanimously to award a Job Development Investment Grant to

Commerce opens Shanghai office

The International Trade Division opened a trade and investment office in Shanghai. The office joins five other Commerce overseas offices: Hong Kong, Canada, Mexico, Japan and Germany. Marlinda Ma will manage the office, working closely with Commerce's foreign and U.S. economic developers and trade experts. Ma is an experienced economic developer who most recently served as the trade commissioner, Ontario Section, for the Consulate General of Canada in Shanghai. The state exports a variety of goods and services to China, including electrical machinery, and pharmaceutical and wood products. The total value of exports from North Carolina businesses to China through October was \$1.73 billion, making China the state's second-largest export market. Commerce developers pitch N.C. to European companies

Martyn Johnson and Dallas Hardenbrook, economic developers with the Division of Business and Industry Development, conducted a March business recruitment trip to Germany, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom, where they are met with leaders of companies that have shown an interest in expanding in North Carolina. John Brennan and Carsten Lex from the State of North Carolina European Office in Frankfurt, Steve Googe of Davidson County, and John Erwin, partner with Parker Poe Adams & Bernstein, also participated in the trip.

Two highlight events of the trip were seminars introducing the state's business climate to representatives of 50 interested German companies. Seminars were held March 16 in Wertheim, near Heilbronn, and March 19 in Würzburg, two cities whose major industries are machine tool manufacturing, automotive and logistics. Each seminar featured testimonials on doing business in North Carolina from local German companies that have recently established facilities in the state.

Conference promotes emerging nanotech field

The N.C. Nanotechnology Commercialization Conference was held March 25 and 26 at the Raleigh Convention Center. More than 215 attendees gathered to discuss the emerging field of nanotechnology and how commercializing it can help grow North Carolina's economy. The conference was organized by the N.C. Board of Science & Technology and the Small Business and Technology Development Center (SBTDC).

During a luncheon keynote speech, Gov. Bev Perdue stressed the importance of nanotechnology in transforming North Carolina into a "hub for innovation." She marveled at how nanotechnology plays an important role in everything from making Navy war ships more water resistant, to fabrics that adapt to keep you cool or warm in hostile climates, to "smart" foundation make-up that can change color to exactly match your skin. Gov. Perdue was introduced by Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco, who called nanotechnology an important subject for the future of North Carolina.

Dr. Joe DeSimone, a pioneer in nanotechnology research and professor at UNC-Chapel Hill and N.C. State University, spoke about his success in using nanotechnology to engineer unique particles for specific needs, such as delivering drugs to targeted cells for more effective cancer treatment. Holder of over 100 patents and a successful entrepreneur who has commercialized almost a dozen companies, Dr. DeSimone inspired the audience with his keynote speech titled "The value of commercializing nanotechnology."



Canadian ambassador visits Raleigh, Charlotte

Canadian Ambassador to the United States Michael Wilson was in Raleigh on April 8 to meet with North Carolina business representatives and state government officials. During a luncheon hosted by Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco, Wilson stressed the importance of strong business ties between North Carolina and his country. He also discussed the significance of a robust trade relationship and how the ties remain strong during this economic slowdown. Wilson spent April 9 in Charlotte.

Canada is North Carolina's largest trade

partner. In 2007, North Carolina exported \$5.6 billion worth of goods and services to Canada. More than 100 Canadian companies have operations in North Carolina, including RBC Centura, the wholly owned subsidiary of the Royal Bank of Canada. Canadian companies support more than 11,000 jobs here. North Carolina's tourism industry has also greatly benefited from Canadian visitors, 946,800 of whom visited North Carolina in 2007.

Perdue launches worker training initiative

Gov. Bev Perdue on April 16 launched "12 in 6", a workforce development initiative designed to benefit job seekers, especially those who have lost their jobs due to recent layoffs and plant closures. The initiative will create community college programs in 12 careers, each requiring less than six months to complete. The N.C. Community College System and the N.C. Dept. of Commerce are collaborating on the program as part of Gov. Perdue's larger JobsNOW initiative, which focuses on job

creation and economic development.

The new training programs will be available at all 58 community colleges by the end of September. The state's 24 workforce boards, <u>JobLink Career Centers</u>, and Employment Security Commission offices will connect job seekers with the training programs and employment opportunities.

Toshiba bringing 194 jobs to Charlotte

Gov. Bev Perdue announced April 28 that Toshiba America Nuclear Energy Corp., a nuclear power plant engineering and construction management company, will open its national project management and engineering center in Mecklenburg County. The company plans to invest \$2.8 million and create 194 new jobs in Charlotte during the next five years.

The state's Economic Investment Committee met April 28 and voted to award a Job Development Investment Grant to Toshiba America Nuclear Energy Corp. to facilitate this new project. While wages will vary by position, the company plans to create new jobs with an average annual wage of \$122,037, not including benefits. This greatly exceeds the Mecklenburg County average annual wage of \$49,400.



Corporate real estate execs meet in Asheville

Deputy Sec. Dale Carroll and economic developers Peggy Anderson and Rod Forsythe attended the 2009 Spring Industrial Asset Management Council (IAMC) Professional Forum May 2-6 at Grove Park Inn in Asheville. IAMC is a national association of corporate real estate executives and economic developers. The forum examined a variety of issues affecting corporate real estate, including global changes reshaping the industrial landscape, the role of real estate

in corporate investment decision-making and the changing U.S. industrial base. This was the first time the forum was held in North Carolina.

The Friends of North Carolina sponsored a dinner for 90 early arrivals May 2 at the inn. On May 3, Commerce joined other N.C. economic development organizations to host a welcome reception for 300 attendees at Biltmore Estates.

Rowan County gets new textile manufacturer, 223 jobs

Gov. Bev Perdue announced May 5 that Sustainable Textile Group LLC, a national manufacturer of fabric

made from pre-consumer waste, will establish a new facility in Rowan County. The company plans to invest \$11 million and create 223 jobs in China Grove during the next two years. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$300,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

Sustainable Textile Group LLC is part of the Sustainable Solutions Network of companies, which includes Sustainable Solutions Inc., Strateline Industries LLC and Circle LLC. The companies offer a wide range of sustainable products and services. Those include non-woven fabrics made from regenerated cotton fibers. The fabric is used in items such as personal wipes and other non-woven materials for the home furnishing, medical and automotive industries.

JDIG helps Siemens Energy expansion

Gov. Bev Perdue announced May 14 that Siemens Energy Inc., an international supplier of products and services for the generation, transmission and distribution of power, will expand its operations in Mecklenburg County. The company plans to invest nearly \$50 million and create 226 jobs in Charlotte during the next five years.

"North Carolina is an international leader in innovative power and energy production, research and design," Perdue said. "Our

state continues to be attractive to leading-edge global companies looking to invest and expand here, thanks to our top-rated business climate, world-class research facilities, and skill and knowledge-based workforce."

N.C.'s biotech, life sciences industries highlighted at BIO

More than 14,000 people from the biotechnology and pharmaceutical industries attended the <u>2009 BIO</u> <u>International Convention</u> held May 18-21 in Atlanta. Commerce staged its 1,600square-foot North Carolina pavilion in the



Georgia World Congress Center during the four-day conference and trade show, and was joined by 35 sponsoring organizations from around the state.

Gov. Bev Perdue's visit to the pavilion on opening day was the highlight of North Carolina's presence at the show. Perdue greeted sponsors and was interviewed by BIO TV about the state's strong commitment to the life sciences industry. Perdue also spoke that evening at a networking reception sponsored by the <u>Friends</u> of North Carolina organization for more than 325 life sciences industry leaders at the Fox Theatre.

Former Gov. Jim Hunt gave the keynote speech at the Biotechnology Institute's Biotechnology Education Banquet on May 17. Several industry executives from North Carolina also had speaking opportunities during the conference, covering topics such as education and training, human resources, finance, business development, industrial biotechnology and regenerative medicine. The <u>N.C. Biotechnology Center</u> was a "helix sponsor" of the convention, elevating North Carolina's profile at the show.

Perdue announces reforms to strengthen green economy

Gov. Bev Perdue on May 21 announced her energy reform package to attract businesses, create jobs and promote a strong and sustainable green economy in North Carolina. She made the announcement at the SAS Solar Farm in Cary, which provides solar-generated power to Progress Energy. Gov. Perdue's energy plan refocuses state energy policymaking, makes strategic investments in North Carolina's green economy and

"The state that gets green right will own the next 50 years," Perdue said. "I intend for North Carolina to be that state."

Perdue's energy plan includes relocating the State Energy Office and state weatherization program to the Dept. of Commerce. According to the plan, the weatherization program will be transferred to the State Energy Office from the Dept. of Health and Human Services. The State Energy Office will be transferred to the Dept. of Commerce from the Dept. of Administration, and will be led by a new energy advisor. The plan also calls for the establishment of an Energy Investment Revolving Loan Fund, expansion of the the Green Business Fund, and growth of a JobsNOW initiative that will provide green-collar jobs training and retraining in community colleges. <u>Read more</u>.

Wilmington film studio unveils biggest stage yet

EUE/Screen Gems Studios has built its biggest stage yet at its filmmaking complex in Wilmington. On May 18, the studio unveiled its new Stage 10, with camera crews getting up on a lift for a panoramic view of the 37,500-square-foot grounds. Stage 10 can simulate day, night, wind, storms and fog, and has a 60 x 60-foot special effects water tank with a depth of 10.5-feet.

N.C. files \$75M green energy plan

The N.C. Energy Office has filed a \$75.9 million N.C. Energy Plan to improve energy efficiency, promote greater use of renewable energy resources and create more green jobs. The program will be funded through the state's share of federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds.

Through ARRA funding to the State Energy Program, North Carolina will significantly increase its investments in energy efficiency and renewable energy in the public and private sectors, build its sustainable energy economy and workforce and promote innovation and development of new energy technologies and resources.

To assist in meeting these goals, North Carolina has identified six focus areas for federal funds:

- Support small businesses and industry through energy savings
- Grow North Carolina's green workforce through JobsNow
- Develop an Energy Investment Revolving Loan Fund
- Improve government energy efficiency
- Promote residential energy efficiency and renewable energy
- Foster renewable energy technology and resource innovation

NACA to bring more than 1,000 jobs to Charlotte

Gov. Bev Perdue announced June 11 that Neighborhood Assistance Corporation of America (NACA), a nationwide nonprofit, community advocacy and homeownership organization, will expand its Charlotte operations. NACA plans to invest \$4 million and create 1,014 jobs over the next five years. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$1 million grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

Headquartered in Boston, NACA operates more than 40 offices nationwide and is one of the most effective community and mortgage companies in the country. The organization, started in 1988, has the primary goal of building strong, healthy neighborhoods nationwide through affordable homeownership. NACA operations include financial counseling, specialized mortgage services and a Home Save program for homeowners with an unaffordable mortgage.

NACA currently employs about 100 workers in Mecklenburg County to originate and process mortgage loans. Under the five-year One North Carolina agreement, the organization plans to add these new jobs to the mortgage loan operation, including 550 jobs to be added immediately. Commerce attends International Air Show

The <u>48th International Air Show</u>, which took place June 16-21 at Le Bourget Exhibition Centre outside Paris, is the world's premier air and space exhibition. Perdue signs film incentives bill

On Aug. 27, Gov. Bev Perdue signed Senate Bill 943 allowing production companies a 25 percent tax credit for film projects in North Carolina, up from the previous credit of 15 percent. The bill also sets minimum spending and hiring requirements for qualifying film companies working in the state.

Companies must spend a minimum of \$250,000 on production costs in the state to be eligible for the tax credit. The bill,

sponsored by Sen. Linda Garrou (D-Forsyth), also requires companies to meet hiring requirements for North Carolinians and other criteria to qualify for the incentive.

SB 943 ensures North Carolina remains a strong competitor for film production dollars, which totaled \$91 million in direct spending in 2008. The industry employs more than 2,500 statewide. Recent major motion pictures filmed in the state include "Nights in Rodanthe," "Leatherheads" and "The Secret Life of Bees." The N.C. film industry is also home to the CW Network's "One Tree Hill" TV series as well as hundreds of commercial and industrial productions each year throughout the state.

Parachute maker brings 375 jobs to Person County

The company, which recently secured a new military contract, plans to expand and renovate two existing nearby buildings to meet increased manufacturing demands. The expanded production will include cutting, sewing and assembly of cargo and flare parachutes for military operations in Afghanistan. The new company, Richmond Specialty Yarns LLC, will produce specialized yarns from fibers and fiber blends to serve the military, medical, protective wear, marine, upholstered furniture and other markets. Salaries for the 135 new jobs will vary by job function, but the overall annual average wage will be \$25,931, not including benefits.

Creativity means business in N.C.

Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco and Cultural Resources Sec. Linda Carlisle on Nov. 24 unveiled the findings of new research showing that the Creative Industry in North Carolina accounts for nearly 300,000 jobs, just over 5.5 percent of the state's workforce, and contributes \$41.4 billion to North Carolina's economy.

The new study, "Creativity Means Business: Economic Contributions of North Carolina's Creative Industry," was prepared by the Policy, Research, and Strategic Planning Division of the N.C. Department of Commerce. The analysis follows Creative Economy research commissioned in 2007 by the North Carolina Arts Council.

"People with creative ideas, innovators, and entrepreneurs bring investment and jobs to our communities," said Gov. Bev Perdue. "This report highlights the creative spark in North Carolina, and will be a big help in economic development." Learn more about the study and read the report.

Walden predicts N.C. to emerge from recession over two years

North Carolina will climb slowly out of recession over the next two years, with the state's metropolitan areas leading the way.

That is the prediction of Mike Walden, William Neal Reynolds professor and North Carolina Cooperative Extension economist in the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at North Carolina State University.

Walden prepares an economic outlook for the state every six months. In his "North Carolina Economic Outlook: Winter 2009," he sees the end of what some have called the "Great Recession," the worst economic downturn since the Great Depression of the 1930s.

Walden sees the North Carolina unemployment rate peaking early in 2010 at between 11.3 and 11.5 percent. From that point, unemployment will gradually improve. North Carolina's unemployment rate stood at 5 percent in December 2007, and Walden does not foresee a return to that number in the near future. The economist sees the jobless rate falling to 9.8 percent by the end of 2010 and to 8.9 percent at the end of 2011. <u>See Walden's Economic Outlook</u>.

Commerce announces County Tier rankings



Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco on Nov. 30 announced the county tier designations for 2010. The designations, which are mandated by state law, determine a variety of state funding opportunities to assist in economic development.

"Our goal is to encourage economic development statewide so all of our residents can find sustainable, well-paying jobs regardless of their location," Crisco said. "The tier designations provide strong tools to help make our less prosperous counties more attractive to businesses looking to relocate or expand."

Nine counties will change tier designations for 2010. Cumberland, Onslow, Pender and Wilson each moved up to a higher tier, while Alexander, Craven, Haywood, Lincoln and McDowell each moved down one tier to a lower ranking for the coming year.

The law calls for the 40 most distressed counties to become Tier 1 counties, the middle 40 counties to be designated as Tier 2 and the 20 most prosperous counties to become Tier 3 counties. In the rankings for the coming year, there was a tie for the 80th spot resulting in 41 Tier 2 counties and 19 in Tier 3.

The rankings are based on an assessment of each county's unemployment rate, median household income, population growth and assessed property value per capita. In addition, any county with a population of less than 12,000 or a county with a population of fewer than 50,000 residents with 19 percent or more of those people living below the federal poverty level automatically are designated as among the most distressed counties.

Tier designations determine the available amount of tax credits for job creation and business property investment in a list of eligible industries. They include manufacturing, motorsports, aircraft maintenance and repair, air courier services, warehousing, customer service call centers, research and development, electronic shopping and mail order houses, wholesale trade and information technology.

All eligible companies are required to offer employees health insurance and pay at least 50 percent of the premiums, cannot owe back taxes and cannot have received a significant environmental violation notice from the state Dept. of Environment and Natural Resources. In Tier 2 and Tier 3 counties, companies also must meet a wage test. Learn more.

Optical systems company to locate U.S. HQ in Wake Forest

On Nov. 23, the <u>N.C. Military Foundation</u> announced that <u>Carl Zeiss Optronics USA Inc.</u> (ZeO USA) will locate its U.S. corporate headquarters in Wake Forest. The facility will serve as ZeO USA's base of operations to provide products for the U.S. defense industry.

ZeO USA, a subsidiary of Carl Zeiss Optronics GmbH, will provide optronics products in support of the U.S. military, homeland defense and law enforcement communities. The company will partner with the foundation, private industry, North Carolina-based universities and defense-oriented business support organizations to pursue research and development and supply contracts for the Department of Defense, the Department of Homeland Security and other agencies.

Commerce participates in international marketing program

A new marketing program to attract European companies to North Carolina was launched last week by Commerce's Marketing Division and the state's seven regional partnership organizations. The year-long program is part of a nationally syndicated initiative known as Global Location Link, which includes support from the U.S. Dept. of Commerce. The program is an integrated marketing effort that employs the latest techniques in direct mail, telemarketing and Web-based platforms to reach company executives who are considering expansion into the United States. The program's Web site, where North Carolina appears as a featured location, includes modern customization features that will deliver personalized Web pages for each visiting executive, as well as extensive visitor tracking systems.

As many as 42,000 executives in Germany, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom will be reached during the 12-month program. <u>See the Web site</u>.

Perdue announces 24,000 Census jobs

Gov. Bev Perdue on Dec. 9 signed Executive Order No. 33 creating the North Carolina Complete Count Committee to coordinate Census activities at the state level. In addition, Gov. Perdue announced that 24,000 Census jobs will be available throughout North Carolina.

The decennial census will take place on April 1. It is administered by the federal government, but requires support at the state and local levels. The state's activities are coordinated by the state's Complete Count Committee (CCC). Individual localities also establish complete count committees in order to coordinate participation in the census.

Over \$400 billion in federal funds will be allocated annually based on the 2010 Census figures. Based on recent estimates, the state will receive approximately \$14,000 in federal funding per person counted over the next 10 years. In addition, Census data is the basis for the N.C. State Demographer's projections, which are used to determine the distribution of state funds.

The Census will also determine whether North Carolina will receive an additional seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. North Carolina narrowly received a 13th congressional district after the 2000 Census by a margin of approximately 800 people. <u>Read more</u>.

The announcement was made possible in part by a state Job Development Investment Grant and One North Carolina Fund award, and is contingent upon approval of local incentives.

"As a technology hub with a vast military presence, the relocation of IEM to North Carolina is a perfect fit that will benefit both the company and the state," Perdue said. "This partnership is another step in creating the top-paying, knowledge-based jobs that I am committed to bringing to North Carolina."

IEM is a privately held company that provides risk-based solutions for measuring and managing threats to people, infrastructure and information. Since IEM's founding in 1985, it has provided emergency management, homeland security, military and information technology solutions to federal governmental agencies including the U.S. Department of Defense, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, as well as working with individual cities, ports and the private sector.

The 430 new jobs will pay an overall average wage of \$62,778 a year, not including benefits. That is higher than the Durham County annual average of \$57,772.


Electrolux is a global leader in home and professional appliances whose products
