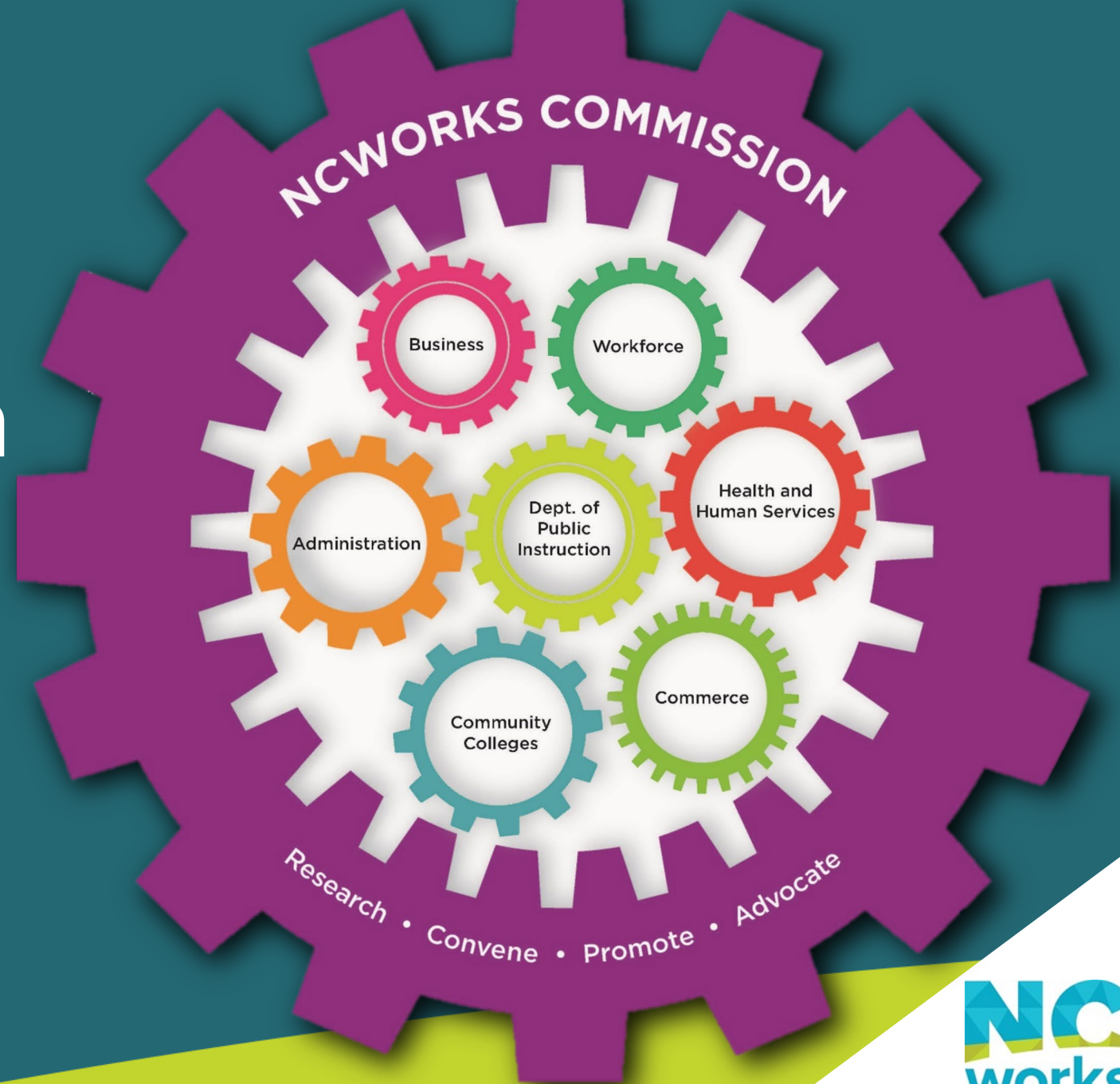

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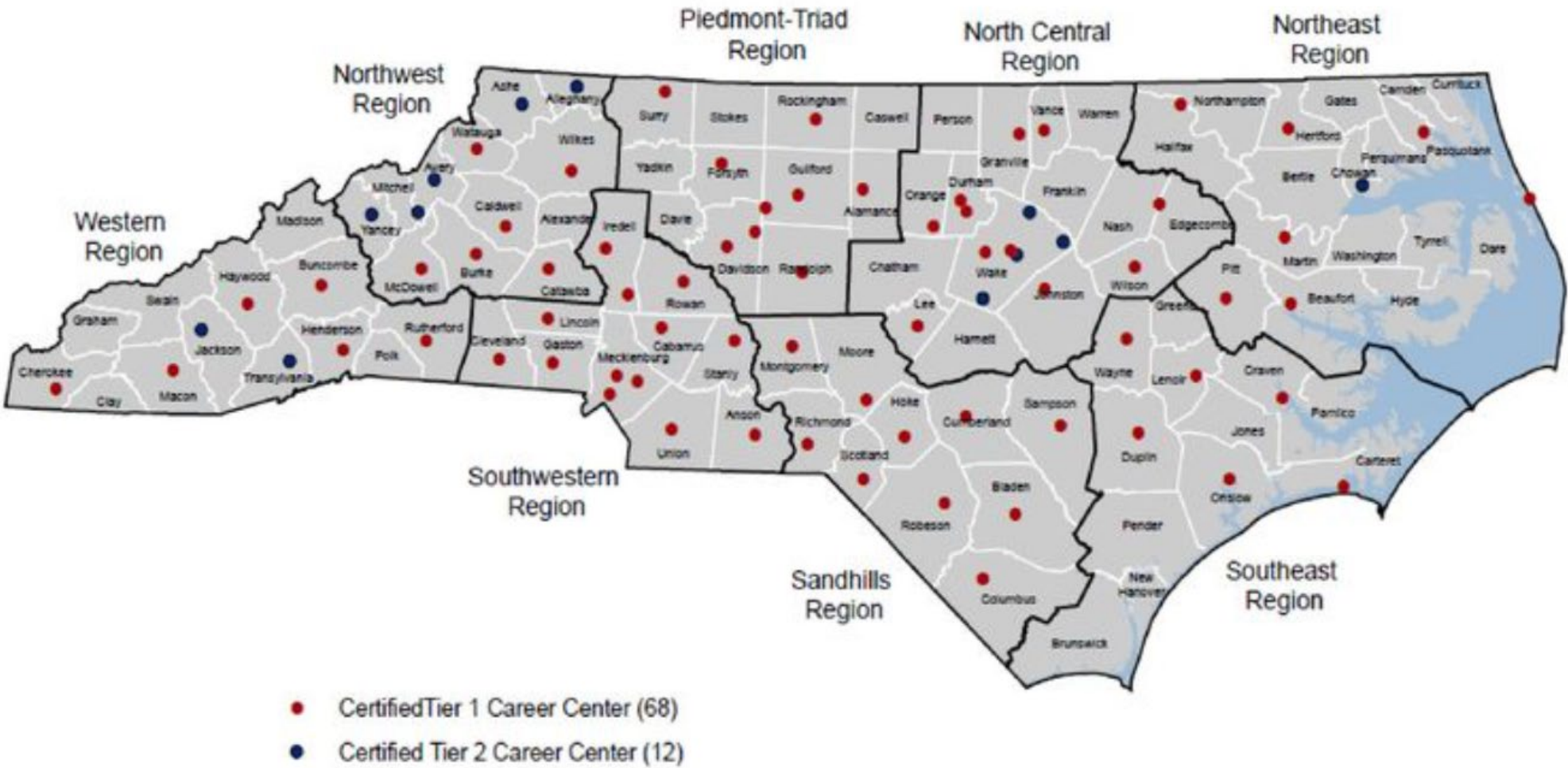
# NCWorks Commission Overview

- Administers North Carolina's workforce development system and advises leadership on how to strengthen the state's workforce
- Develops policy to align workforce programs that support a comprehensive and streamlined workforce development system
- Assesses the effectiveness of Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act core programs
- Certifies the NCWorks Career Centers and provides continual improvement and technical assistance to local area workforce development boards.

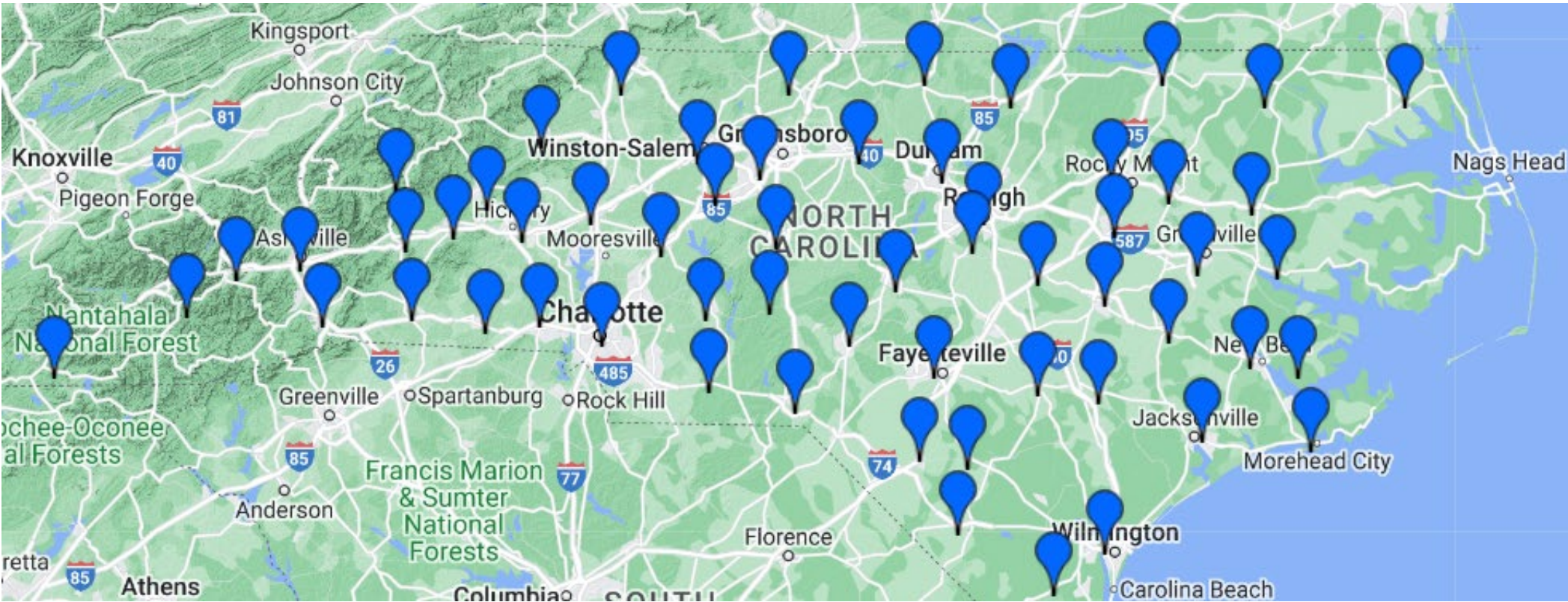
# What is a Local Area Workforce Board?

- There are two types of workforce development boards, or WDBs: state boards and local area boards
- The state WDB, appointed by the governor, makes state workforce policy and ensures compliance with federal mandates
- A local area WDB makes workforce policy for its region and oversees local career centers that provide training and employment services. NC has 22 local workforce development boards.
- Board members represent employers, unions, community-based service providers, educational institutions, government economic development agencies
- Local area WDBs make decisions including who should get priority for service, how much money is available for training and what schools or other entities are qualified to receive funds for training
- Chairperson and 51% of members must come from the private sector
